### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Green Mountain Seminary is prominently located on a plateau in the rural village of Waterbury Center. Built in the Italianate style, the 3 1/2 story, wood-frame clapboarded building sits on a high stone foundation. Its T-plan with intersecting gable roofs contain entrances at the corners of the central intersecting wing and on the gable-ends of the main block.

The doorways are distinguished by arched transoms set between scrolled brackets supporting hoods. The 9 bay front facade and 5 bay side facades all contain 6/6 windows on the first three floors, the second floor more elongated than the first, the third story windows shortened.

A full cornice runs at the eave line of the building with pairs of scrolled brackets and pendants at each corner. A pair of scrolled brackets and pendants are found in the peak of each gable, each gable also containing a large single arched window flanked by two segmental windows. Two original chimneys cap the ridge of the asphalt-shingle roof, the original central cupola destroyed.

On the interior, the original floor plan is retained on the second and third floors of the building, the first floor altered for adaptive reuse as a library and day-care center for the Waterbury-community.

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Green Mountain Seminary building has been the largest and most conspicuous landmark in Waterbury Center since its completion in 1869. It has remained in continuous use as an educational building since that time. The Free Will Baptist Seminary's first catalog called the Italianate style building "new and elegant one of the finest structures in the state . . . it is removed from the bustle and distraction of large commercial villages; is free from the haunts of vice and dissipation or temptation to idleness; and is surrounded by natural scenery unsurpassed in its magnificence and grandeur."

The first and second floors were used for educational purposes, with a chapel on the second floor. The third floor and top floor were used for "gentlemen's rooming." The entering class was made up of 106 gentlemen and 104 ladies. In 1878 it became the property of the principal, Miss Elizabeth Colley. She conducted a summer boarding house in the three-story lodge building, demolished in 1938. In 1881, it housed the Minard Commercial School, as well. In 1895, "The Green Mountain Seminary Association" was deeded to the town for use as a graded school. It now houses the Hunger Mountain Day Care Center and the Waterbury Center Library.

The belfry tower and walkway were torn down in 1941; otherwise the building is little changed.
