DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Daniel Holland House, dating from c. 1854, is an impressive two-story brick building in the Italianate style. The hipped roof is of very low pitch.

The first story of the facade is three bays wide and faces west. The pair of double panel doors is surrounded by a portico which is supported by columns in the front and pilasters in the rear. The entablature contains a denticulated and bracketted cornice. This central doorway is flanked on either side by twin bay windows. Each of these windows has a similarly denticulated and bracketted cornice. Beneath the bay windows are decorated wooden panels. The center window panel features a beautiful portrait in stained glass. The second story of the facade consists of three two-over-two windows which are framed by granite lintels and sills. All of the bays in the facade are contained in a recessed panel. The main cornice is denticulated.

The north and south sides of the building consist of two windows on each of the two stories. Each window is similar in structure and decoration to the second storm windows of the facade.

Attached to the main building is an ell with window structure we similar to the sides and with a similarly denticulated cornice. A wooden extension of the ell connects it to a two-story frame carriage house with gabled roof.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The original owner of the Holland House, Captain Daniel Holland, was an important member of the Lewiston community. A successful businessman, dealing with lumber and real estate, he was also very active in the promotion of early industrial development. In 1868, he became a member of the governor's council, and in 1870 and 1871, he served as a member of the Maine State Senate.

A later owner of this residence was Judge Franklin M. Drew. He was a prominent figure in the history of Maine as well as of Lewiston. Once a Judge of Probate in Androscoggin County, he also played an important role in the state legislature, and served as Secretary of State. He gained most of his local notoriety through service as an officer of the Lewiston Trust and Safe Deposit Company as well as Treasurer of Bates College. During the Civil War, he was made Colonel of the 15th Maine Regiment of Volunteers. His flourishing legal practice kept him in the public eye.for many years.

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In addition to the historical significance of its past owners, the house has architectural significance of its own. Worthy of special note are the stained glass portraits found in the central window panel of each of the twin bay windows in the facade. One is of Henry Wadsworth Longellow; the other is of Mozart. The house itself is beautifully maintained and is a fine example of the Italianate style.
