DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The five-story, steel-reinforced Bullock's Wilshire Building is two stories in height on both the Wilshire Place and Westmoreland intersections of Wilshire Blvd. The structure is graduated from this two-story base to three-and four-story sections. Located on the facade is a six-story tower with a copper sheathed extension. A glassed patio with a Fresco-Secco ceiling is located to the rear of the structure, and a large parking lot is adjacent to this patio.

The Art Deco, buff terra-cotta and green copper building has marked vertical lines and an irregular setback construction for three stories. A landscaped block surrounds the structure and gardens are featured on both levels of the motor court. Copper work in a jagged zig-zag pattern is found along the parapet roofline and is framed by square, vertically-marked columns decorated with a woven-look terra-cotta design. Elaborately designed green copper spandrels are situated between each floor. The display window casings and copper sun screen awnings are decorated in geometric styling similar with that of the other copper work located on the building. A flag pole and brass lighting are located by the Wilshire Blvd. entrance. Surrounding the flagpole are raised low-relief decorations.

The interior of the central foyer is cube styled with high marble walls and lighting which extends down the walls. Adjacent to this foyer are numerous departments including an octagonal shoe room and a Directoire room of Evening Apparel. The floor coverings include marble, travertine, and linotile in gray and black. The interior doors and lighting and other fixtures have similar styling; the elevator doors are done in a moderne fashion and carry out the use of copper in a combination of brass and gunmetal.

Several of the rooms have been altered and remodeled but many of the departments remain as they were constructed. The exterior remains unaltered with the minor exception of the Herman Sach mural located on the motor court which was protectively covered and retouched by Heinburgan in 1973.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

John G. Bullock built his first department store at 7th Street and Broadway in downtown Los Angeles. Twenty-two years later he built a second store on Wilshire Blvd. In doing so, Bullock was not only the first successful merchandiser to set up a rival business to himself in the same city but was the first merchant to experiment with a department store outside the main downtown business district. In moving a major store to this location, he helped facilitate the gradual move of the business district from downtown Los Angeles to the Wilshire district.

The building itself was designed by John and Donald Parkinson, two well-known Los Angeles architects. At the time of its construction, local newspapers referred to the structure as a temple to merchandizing. Today the buff terra-cotta Bullock's Wilshire with its copper-sheated, three-story extention on the six-story tower and its copper bands between the various floors stands as the finest example of Art Deco architecture in the Los Angeles area.

No expense was spared in construction of the store. Display cases are made of English laurel and rosewood, the chandeliers are crystal and many of the walls are of rose marble.

The department store organization is unique; it was one of the first merchandise stores to establish virtually separate stores within each department. The establishment prided itself on the fact that an entire ensemble could be purchased by shopping in only one department. Bullock's Wilshire is renowned for its designer fashions. In 1969 the store exclusively introduced to the Western United States the ready-to-wear collections of Givenchy and Phillippe Venet, both of their boutiques were re-created in the boutique shop section to house the collections.

The original interior shops, many of which remain in their original condition, were designed by well-known interior decorators, Feil and Paradise (in collaboration with Jack V. Peters). Original art works located throughout the store include an abstract wood mural by G. Stojana titled, "The Spirit of Sports" in the Sportswear Shop, a painted glass ceiling by Herman Sach's in the Tearoom, and a Fresco-Secco ceiling depicting the evolution of transportation by Sach in the motor court entrance.

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The structure, with its cubic design, is a landmark of the Wilshire area. It s Art Deco architectural styling took its basis from the style that was popular in Southern California during the late 1920's and early 1930's, but the Bullock's Wilshire is the most noteworthy, in both interior and exterior composition, of these types in the Los Angeles area.

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
