DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Nave apartment block is a three-story $80' \times 120'$ stone and brick building in the Swiss Chalet style. The dark brown sand stone came from architect Nave's Swallow's Nest quarry. The symmetrical facade is characterized by centered second and third story balconies of rustic wood, which are flanked by two-and-one-half story bays with bracketed gables. A shed dormer breaks the roof line and an abbreviated wing on the left side has a gabled roof and second and third story balconies.

The Swiss Chalet motif is further enhanced by the diamond patterned windows flanking the doors and the exposed rafters in the overhanging eaves. Nave was possibly influenced by the chalet-style buildings popularized in the Northwest by Spokane architect K. K. Cutter.

Although the interior was damaged several times by fires in the 1920's, the exterior remains unaltered.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Nave apartment block is architecturally significant as a good example of romantic apartment house architecture of the early twentieth century. At the time of its construction it was the most pretentious apartment in Lewiston. Stone apartment blocks and good examples of the Swiss chalet style are both rare in Idaho.

Owner, architect, and builder Nave was one of the foremost architects in Lewiston during the opening decades of the twentieth century. He emigrated from Kansas in 1903 and was responsible for many of Lewiston's finer buildings including Saint Stanislaus Church, Baptist church, Bollinger Hotel, Vollmer building, and Kettenbach block. He also designed many Camas Prairie schools, the Wilkes block in Grangeville, and a bank in Glendale, Arizona.
