*OWINGS HOUSE -- OWINGSVILLE, KY.*

Built 1811-14 for Col. Thomas Deye Owings by Benjamin Latrobe, who re-designed the interior of the U.S. Capitol after the British burned it, War of 1812. This house was a center of social life during early 1800's, Henry Clay, while U.S. Secretary of State, attended a grand ball here. Reputedly, in 1814, someone posing as Prince Louis Philippe was a guest at the home.

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
