DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Construction on the William H. Mann house began in August 1881, two weeks after he purchased a city block for his residential site. The house is basically vernacular Italianate in style and features a bracketed and dentiled cornice under the eaves. The stairhall protrudes from the front hall of the house producing, in effect, an entrance tower which becomes the focal point of the composition with its steeply pitched Mansard roof and iron cresting. Low pitched hipped roofs cover the remainder of the house, with iron cresting surmounting the truncated roof over the main body of the structure. The front porch was modified from the original which was similar to the small side porch at the southwest corner of the building. In the 1940's, the Zwoneček family had the house covered with aluminum siding, which the present owners are contemplating removing.

The interior of the house is in near original condition due to careful preservation by the Zwonečeks and tasteful repair and decorating by the present owners. The stairhall opens to the west into the front parlor which connects to the back parlor via a wide doorway. The dining room features built in cabinets and cupboards along the west wall, which once housed a passageway for a dumbwaiter carrying food from the original basement kitchen directly below the dining room. The present kitchen (ca. 1900) is located just north of the dining room. The large porch on the east side of the house is directly off the dining room. The stairway rises along the east wall of the stairhall and ends in a north-south hallway off of which are several bed chambers. The house was pictured in A. T. Andreas' History of Nebraska, 1882, pp. 1353.

There are two outbuildings on the property, a barn and chicken house. The barn, (located directly north of the house) is not original, however it was probably erected ca. 1900. It is large enough to have housed several horses and perhaps two buggies or wagons. The second floor was used for hay storage. The lean-to projection on the south was added ca. 1920's by the Zwoneček family to make room for their automobile in the building. The chicken house is situated just east of the barn and appears to be of turn of the century vintage. Both of these outbuildings are used for storage.

SPECIFIC DATES

William H. Mann was born in New York in 1833. He learned the milling trade as a youth and pursued this career as he worked his way west. In 1869, Mann settled in Johnson County, Nebraska and laid out the town of Sterling where in 1870, he built a grist mill. Mann moved farther west in 1874 to the two year old town of Wilber and obtained the water rights on the Big Blue River. That same year, he and town-founder C. D. Wilber built the Wilber Mills for \$19,000. This mill prospered for twenty years supplying the surrounding area with flour, rye, farina etc. and then was sold in 1894 to John Zwoneček and Joseph Aksamit, who later also became proprietors of the DeWitt Mills (see pending NRHP). William Mann also sold this house to the Zwoneček family in 1894 who continued to occupy it until 1968.

The milling enterprise founded by Mann was the chief industry in Wilber for several decades (it is no longer extant) and enjoyed a wide circle of trade under his leadership. Mann was also a civic-minded individual and did much to enhance the commercial and social climate of the community.

The William H. Mann house is the only extant home of imposing grandeur in Wilber dating to the early 1880's. Built with both Italianate and Second Empire features, the plan is thoroughly Victorian in character with an asymetrical arrangement of rooms. These rooms are juxtaposed in a complex manner which creates the many varied protrusions in the exterior form of the house. The overall form of the house is reflected in the complexity of the plan outline. Bay windows and elaboration of the exterior walls do much to enhance its Victorian character. Roof lines, while not simple, do not achieve the complexity of form which the later Victorian styles represent. The William Mann house is a good example of early Nebraska vernacular Victorian architecture.
