### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This is a three story building with basement. The first two stories of Wood Lawn are of clapboard and are painted white. The third story consists of a mansard roof with projecting windows. There is a wing to the left of the main portion of Wood Lawn (as you face it from its front) which also is two stories in height with a mansard roof with projecting windows.

Along the front of the main portion of the house there is a covered porch. The porch's roof is supported by Doric-styled columns. A balustrade runs the length of the roof of the porch.

There are two projecting bays of two stories' height on the front of Wood Lawn. These are also topped by balustrades.

The windows projecting from the mansard roof are topped by classical pediments.

A Palladian window is located in the second floor windows that are located directly over the front entrance.

The rear of the main portion of the house has a small porch for an entrance. There are also two bays projecting from the rear, but unlike the front of the house, these extend from the ground upward including the mansard roof.

Wood Lawn was originally built in 1850 by Colonel James Neilson (1784-1862) on land purchased by his mother's grandfather, Johannis Voorhees, from Cornelius Van Langevelt in 1720. Van Langevelt had purchased the land from Indians about 40 years earlier.

The house was originally an almost perfect square (40 by 44 feet). It is located on a sloping hill with a view overlooking the Raritan River and New Brunswick. The original house had a hipped roof, supported on the front by tall columns. The portico was ten feet wide. On the back was a porch of equal width but 32 feet long.

There was a kitchen, milk room, wine cellar, and root cellar in the basement. Four rooms and pantry were on the first floor. Finished rooms were on the second floor.

In 1850, the wing was added to the house. This was to be the new location of the kitchen.

In 1868, the semi-curcular or bay window extensions were made to the main portions of the house. At this time the front portico was changed into a porch and a mansard roof was substituted for the hipped roof.

The last extensive alterations to the house were made in 1905 by the architectural firm of McKim, Mead and White. The right half of the structure (as one faces the front) was moved so that the center entrance hall was widened from eight to seventeen feet. The second floor Palladian window as well as other classical elements were added to Wood Lawn at this time. This includes the classical pediments over the mansard windows, the balustrades, the classical columns of the porches. The building was transformed from a decidedly Second Empire Victorian structure into its present neo-classical state. The beauty and elegance of Wood Lawn must be ascribed to the McKim firm.

Wood Lawn was built by Colonel James Neilson (1784-1862). His father, John Neilson (1745-1833) was Colonel of the Middlesex County minutemen. He was a trustee of Rutgers College from 1782 until his death. Lafayette presented John Neilson with a sword and came to visit him during his American tour of 1824.

James Neilson saw military action himself as the commander of a company during the War of 1812. He was a prominent New Brunswick businessman, promoting steamboat, canal and railroad transportation. James Neilson served on the Rutgers Board of Trustees from 1833 until 1862.

James Neilson in turn had a son whom he named James (1844-1937). James made a trip to Europe in 1870. He there met another individual on the Grand Tour, Mary Putnam of Norwalk, Connecticut. They were married in Berlin in 1870. James Neilson and his wife, who died in 1914, would have no children. Mrs. Neilson founded a Boy's Club in New Brunswick as well as the New Brunswick Free Public Library, one of the first in the State.

James Neilson served on the Board of Trustees of Rutgers from 1886 until his death in 1937. He was one of the University's most generous benefactors. Neilson presented most of the land on what is now the Voorhees Campus to the University. This is the area bounded by George Street, Hamilton Street, College Avenue, and Seminary Place in New Brunswick. He also donated an athletic field for the use of the college. The present University Commons stands on the site. He also donated land for the use of the Agricultural School. Neilson also made funds available for the purchase of College Hall at Douglass College. At Neilson's death, he left Wood Lawn to the University. It was originally used by the Associated Alumnae of Douglass. It is now the office of the Eagleton Institute of Politics.
