DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The John Bray House of Kittery, possibly dating from the late 17th century, is a massive and well-preserved dwelling, to which have been added numerous later elements.

The house is of post-and-beam construction, with a large central chimney, gable roof, clapboard siding, and field-stone foundation. Fenestration is 9/6 in the first story, with 6/6 in the second. The central entrance is flanked by Ionic pilasters and covered by an entablatured lintel; this door enframement. with sidelights, derives from the 19th century.

A two-story addition on the east end of the building was built in 1916, and features a first-story sun porch.

West of the building a long studio room (built early in the 20th century) connects the house with another building moved to this location early in this century. This latter building is of $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories with a central chimney and a 3-bay facade which faces west. It was originally built in the mid-19th century by Thomas 0. Hoyt and for years was used as a general store before being moved to its present location.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The most pleasing location in Kittery Point was chosen by John Bray, of Plymouth, Devon, for the location of his new-world house in 1662. The Bray House has a commanding view of Portsmouth Harbor.

Although there is some reason to believe that elements of this original dwelling exist within the present house, it is not really possible to date the structure earlier than about 1710-20, making it still one of the oldest, if not the oldest house in Maine. Folklore persists in assigning 17th century dates to several buildings in the Kittery-York area but no hard evidence exists that any major portion of a Maine structure predates 1700.

Judging from portions of the interior, major renovations were carried out in the mid-18th century since the drawing room and other downstairs areas are formal Georgian in decor with deep relief panelling and heavy cornices.

As mentioned in the description (#7), additions, including another complete house moved from another location, have been added in this century.

Nevertheless, the basic structure of the Bray House, at least as it stood c.1720, remains in its magnificent location; certainly among a handful of Maine's longest surviving houses.
