DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The O'Farrell house stands on a large, handsomely landscaped lot which fills the northeast corner of Fifth and Franklin Streets in Boise. It is a tall two-story brick, now painted white, in a Colonial Revival style with Queen Anne elements. That is, the body of the house is symmetrical and rectangular in plan. It has a laterally-running hip-and-ridge roof, from the planes of which centered hipped dormers emerge. Lines of dentils run under the eaves, and elaborate a curved pediment over a classicizing front entry. A Queen Anne taste shows, however, in the placement of a two-story, tent-roofed octagonal bay at the southwest corner and a one-story square bay on the east wall, which render the house minimally asymmetrical. It shows also in the ornate Italianate eave brackets, the slightly left-of-center placement of the entry, and the picturesque use of round hip knobs at every possible intersection of the roof planes. The square-arched windows are capped with stone lintels. An added historic feature of the exterior is a graceful Colonial Revival fence made up of sections of balustrade from the lost Dewey Palace Hotel at Nampa, a famous local landmark.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The O'Farrell house in Boise, as a brick residence built in 1892 by one of the founders of Boise City, is both architecturally and historically significant. Architecturally, it is a good and very well-preserved example of the substantial residences built in the 1890's by the pioneers of the 1800's. In recently-settled Idaho, such houses are quite uncommon. While mansions of comparable age survive in Boise and elsewhere in the state (e.g. the 1891-2 Moore-Cunningham house on Warm Springs Avenue, or the contemporary Bush house on Franklin), many substantial houses of the more modest proportions of the O'Farrell house were of frame construction and are lost or deteriorated. The mansions, too, tend to be fully-blown Queen Anne in style; the O'Farrell house, dating as it does from 1892, is one of the earliest and best examples in the capital city of the Colonial Revival taste in brick residential design, here only marginally modified by the The house may thus be seen as a very early example Queen Anne. of 2 "Queen Anne-going-classical" transitional style which is quite common in Idaho during the first decade of the twentieth century.

The historical significance of the house is its association with one of the founders of Boise, John Andrew O'Farrell (1823-1900). O'Farrell was a native of Ireland who became a sailor at the age of 15. His travels brought him to California at the time of the first discoveries of gold there. He subsequently became a miner, and his prospecting activities led him to Idaho in 1863. The O'Farrell cabin, which now stands on Fort Street a few blocks from the later residence, was one of the first dwellings in what is now Boise; a Catholic Mass said there in the summer of 1863 was one of the earliest religious services. O'Farrell made Boise his home until his death. He retained extensive mining and land interests; he was one of the promoters of the New York Canal, which tapped the Snake River for irrigation purposes. He was considered one of Boise City's most prominent men, and 420 Franklin, built to the design of N.W. Bower at a cost of \$8,000 in 1892, one of its finest homes.
