## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Riverview is situated on a bluff overlooking the Cumberland River in the outskirts of Clarksville, Tennessee. The small lawn surrounding the house is reasonably level; the remainder of the 4.5 acre site is wooded and falls off steeply in all directions.

Constructed about 1830 the house is a one-story, brick cottage on a raised brick basement. Two interior brick chimney stacks bisect the ridge of the gable roof. On the facade (west elevation) a small portico supported by paneled pillars frames a doorway with a transom, which is the center bay of this five-bay, symmetrical elevation. On the east wall, paneled pillars support a three-bay, full-height portico with a gallery at the first floor level. Two small windows in the north gable end light the attic chamber. The bricks on the facade are laid in Flemish bond and the east elevation in six-course American bond. The exterior walls are painted white. Four iron tie rods connect the front and rear walls.

In plan, a center passage with open stairway separates a single room on the north side of the house from a pair of rooms on the south. The basement level is similarly arranged; but the attic contains only one finished chamber and one unfinished storage room. Bathrooms have been inserted in the passageways, the only significant alterations to the plan.

The major part of the original interior woodwork survives. On the main floor all three mantels are Tennessee vernacular interpretations of late Federal designs. In the small chamber above, the fireplace opening is framed by a simple molding of a design and arrangement frequently used in the late eighteenth century. On the ground level, a small portion of the original brick floor is still visible, although most has been concealed under a modern flooring and carpeting. At the main level, modern hardwood flooring has been installed. The original flooring survives, however, at the upper level.

The property nominated (4.5 acres) is the entire parcel of land owned by Hayden Jolly, Jr. The attached survey map indicates the precise boundaries of this tract.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

In the 1930s Riverview was purchased by Ben Tate for his brother Allen Tate who, with his wife Caroline Gordon, lived in the house until the mid-1940s. Tate was at this time developing a strong reputation as poet-critic and was an active member of the Fugitives, a group of writer-scholars who in the mid-1920s established at Vanderbilt University a literary magazine called <u>The Fugitive</u>.

The Fugitive group, as they have since been called, was made up of sixteen men, the most prominent being Robert Penn Warren, Tate, John Crowe Ransom, Donald Davidson and Merrill Moore. These men were to publish among them over a hundred volumes on a vast range of subjects. They founded or renovated the most important literary journals of their time and established what has come to be called the "new criticism." They garnered the highest literary honors for themselves, transformed the study of literature in the United States, and established a new profession of letters.

Tate and Gordon became hosts to the group following their university days, and reunions of the group held at Riverview produced several poems like Davidson's "Voices on the Cumberland," recounting a poetry-reading session before the fireplace. Such noted guests as poet-critic Malcolm Cowley and William Faulkner shared the hospitality.

During their stay at Riverview Caroline Gordon wrote a novel, <u>Children of Innocence</u>, set in the house and Tate published one of his most widely acclaimed poems, "Ode to the Confederate Dead."

Possibly as a result of Ben Tate's patronage of his brother who, to the community, was one of those strange "artist-types," locals began to call the house "Ben Folly."

Architecturally, the house is a well-preserved example of the raised-cottage style built throughout the South during the early nineteenth century. Although one of the oldest houses in the area, it retains almost all its original Federal style mantels and interior trim. In plan, also, the house remains virtually unchanged.
