

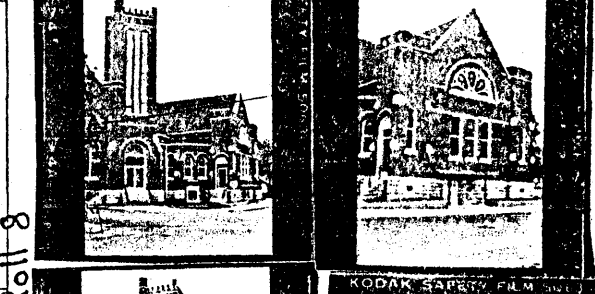

18. Description 1/2 story brick; L-shaped main block with subsidiary blocks in angle + on N; entry tower in angle, faces corner of streets; stone detail; buttress strips; round arched openings



19. History 1st Colored Baptist Church - 1873 - plaque
State St. Baptist was the first formally organized church for Blacks in B.G. It was organized in 1858 from the slave membership of the First Baptist Church of B.G. From the beginning this church functioned autonomously from any white church. The property was given to the church in 1867. The present structure was built in 1898.

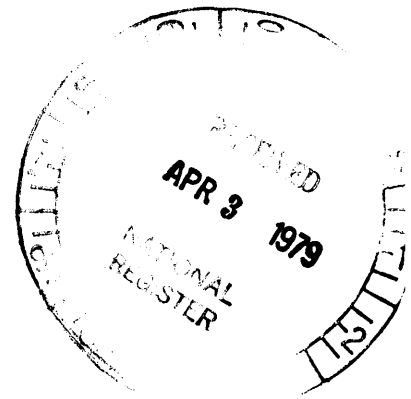


20. Significance The State Street Baptist was the first formally organized church for blacks in Bowling Green. - It was begun in 1838. Particular clear illustration of a common style.

Wa-B-9. One of the few remaining structures widely recognized for its links with Bowling Green's nineteenth century black community, this church was the first formally organized church for blacks in the city. The structure is architecturally significant as a robust, turn-of-the-century of Gothi-Romanesque Revival styling.
