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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

"Barncastle", located in the Town of Blue Hill, Maine, is an elaborate and distinctive house. Designed by George Clough and built in 1884, the building is a sprawling complex in the Shingle style with additional eccentric details.

The 1 1/2 story house is of frame construction with gambrel roof, three internal

brick chimneys, shingle siding, and field-stone foundation.

The asymmetrical facade faces north and is dominated by a semi-circular projecting bay of two-stories with a roof of bellcast form and double-hung sash fenestration. To the left of this bay is an open porch at the north-east corner. To the right is a one-story porch which runs across the rest of the facade. Within this porch, adjacent to the projecting bay, is the building's main entrance, a single door flanked by pairs of multi-panel windows. Above this entrance is a five-sided dormer with segmental roof; fenestration is multi-paned casements. To the right of this dormer is a larger one with gabled roof, containing a 2/2 window flanked by multi-paned double-hung windows.

The east and west ends of the house likewise contain asymmetrical fenestration, that on the east side being 2/2, on the west 6/6 along with two oval windows--one blind,

one functional.

Extending from the rear of the house to the south is a one-story gable-roofed ell of simple design. Beyond this is an arched carriage-way flanked on both its east and west sides by circular towers with conical roofs. This in turn leads to an attached carriage-house and barn, both of which have gambrel roofs.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

"Barncastle" is primarily significant as an eccentric variation or extension of the Single Style. Secondarily it possesses a unique architectural history.

Originally occupying the site was a late Federal cape, built in 1834. This undistinguished house was the birthplace of Effie Ober who married John D. Rockefeller's lawyer and became Effie Kline. Mrs. Kline in 1884, apparently not wishing to destroy her birthplace, built the present house around it, completely obscuring it in all respects except for a portion of the shingle roof still visible within the attic of the present structure.

The present house is filled with architectural peculiarities including a split staircase rising out of a two-story foyer with an inside window and balcony on the second level. Also of note are the broad arches reaching between two pairs of turrets across the driveway between house and barn. A further unusual feature is the bellcast roofed semi-tower which emerges from the front of the gambrel roof.
Although unconvential in many respects, "Barncastle", nonetheless emerges as a striking

and impressive summer cottage.
