Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Amos F. Gerald House of Fairfield, Maine is a unique structure which draws its inspiration from the castle and thus could be stylistically termed "Medieval Revival".

The house, dating from 1909-13, is of cementblock construction and consists of two stories with a three-story central tower, all covered by flat roofs. Fenestration is generally 1/1, the windows being rectangular with slightly projecting lintels save for the third floor of the tower where they are arched.

The cornice of the tower is a machicolated parapet with crenellation above. Originally the cornice of the house itself was crenellated, but this has been removed. There is a central entrance in the tower, covered by a semi-circular portico with crenellated cornice, supported by large columns. A semi-circular veranda flanks the portico; this once had a balustraded railing which is now a solid-brick wall.

The ends of the house are 2 bays wide and each has a one-story projecting bay of semi-circular form. Here too crenellation has been lost, replaced by solid brick.

Attached to the rear of the house is a $1\frac{1}{2}$ -story frame ell with gambrel roof and clapboard siding.

The cement block medium is well executed in this building to mimic granite, with rusticated quoins. The blocks were made under the personal supervision of Mr. Gerald.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Amos Gerald House in Fairfield is significant in at least three respects: 1. It was built by the first and foremost pioneer in the development of the once vast trolley car system in Maine. 2. It is designed in a rare vernacular architectural style drawn from the medieval castle. 3. It is very possibly the first residence ever constructed of cement blocks in Maine and perhaps New England.

Born in Benton in 1841, Amos Gerald, after spending three years in his early twenties as a miner and lumberman in California, returned to Maine taking up residence in Fairfield. His business career began in 1868 with the manufacture of a curtain fixture of his own invention. He also invented a successful drop head sewing machine.

After a brief sojourn in New York City in the early 1880's he returned imbued with ideas of establishing a Waterville-Fairfield street railway. At first horse drawn, it was electrified in 1890, and was the first of a dozen trolley systems built by Gerald, many much longer. He also was involved in the successful consolidation of several groups of local lines into larger, more efficient systems.

In 1886 he founded in Fairfield the first electric light company in Maine.

In order to popularize trolley use and also to provide public recreation, Gerald developed a number of amusement parks, skating rinks, band stands and the like along various routes in scenic locations. He also built the famed Casco Castle, a medieval style summer hotel in South Freeport and the Hotel Gerald in Fairfield topped with three golden domes and known for its luxurious interior and fixtures. Always public spirited, he is quoted as stating, "I had rather see the people riding on railroads I have helped build and enjoying them than to lay up money in the bank".

On the day of his funeral in September, 1913, every trolley car throughout the limits of the state stood still for three minutes.
