ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Greek Revival; two stories tall, rectangular plan, gable roof, common bond brick construction, asphalt shingle roof; front facade consists of three bays on first and second floor, first floor has been altered by a c. 1950 addition to the front, second floor has three outset 8/8 sash windows, each of which is divided from the other by a two story brick pilaster with a corbelled cap, all of the pilasters support a brick entablature and cornice, gable end has boxed cornice which goes across the gable to form the cornice of the entablature, circular louvered vent in the center of the gable end; interior unknown; property surrounded by c. 1900 one story commercial buildings and an Art Deco bus station: no landscaping; fair condition.

HISTORICAL NARRATIVE (FROM ORIGINS TO PRESENT): Known as "The Broad Street Methodist Episcopal Church South," this sanctuary served its original congregation from date of construction (1873) to 1912, at which time the worshippers sold the Broad Street property and relocated at 1605 Third Ave. One of Columbus' two daily newspapers, <u>The Columbus Ledger</u>, occupied the building from 1915 to 1931, and, later, the church housed Columbus' chapter of the Benevolent and Protective Order of the Elks. Presently, the property is owned by "Non-A-Gon," a group of eight business people.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): <u>Religion</u>: This church is significan as it is one of the oldest existing sanctuaries in downtown Columbus. When it was used as a church, this structure served one of the oldest congregations in the city. <u>Architecture</u>: This building is architecturally significant as the only Greek Revival church standing in Columbus. It shows fine craftsmanship in its pilasters with corbelled brick capitals. This church is one of the oldest extant buildings on Broadway (Columbus Main Street).
