DESCRIPTION	ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION: Chicago Commercial style; four stories tall, rectangular plan, flat roof; balloon frame construction with stretcher bond masonry exterior walls with piers on first floor of smooth and rusticated granite, composition roof; front facade details include first floor granite piers with corinthian capitals supporting complete entablature, second floor has flat arch windows, third has rounded arch with keystone, pilasters run between windows up to fourth floor, between third and fourth floor is architrave and cornice of terracotta, fourth floor has flat arch windows, over central entrance are three bays which are recessed and use the arch motif of the (CONT.)

IV.SIGNIFICANCE	STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL): Local History - This building is significant as a turn-of-the-century Masonic Temple, which later became a major commercial center in downtown Columbus, housing offices of leading professionals and businessmen. Architecture - Massive in size when compared to the average commercial building in Columbus, this is the only example of the Chicago Commercial building in town. It is Sullivanesque in the use of the tall vertical pilasters and over all upward thrust of the facades. It also shows some influence of John Wellborn Root in its Romanesque detailing, such as the granite piers on the first floor, the rounded arches on the 3rd (CONT.)
