DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Haberkorn house is a 2½ story structure, built of roughly dressed ashlar limestone on a limestone foundation in 1870. At the NW corner is a one-story kitchen wing, also of stone, that was added in 1876. A shed-roofed wooden porch, with standing-seam metal roof, extends the full width of the rear elevation to meet a small frame summer kitchen attached to the north wall of the stone kitchen wing.

The main roof (covered with composition shingle) is a jerkinhead gable, with the ridge running perpendicular to the front. Below each gable end, the simply-molded frieze boards have arches cut in their lower edges to accomodate the arches of the attic windows.

The double doors of the main entrance (above which is a dressed stone block incised with the builder's name, "G. Haberkorn", and the date, "1870", are sheltered by a small hipped-roof porch with slender turned posts. The rear entrance (obscured by the screened porch) is flanked by sidelights.

All window openings have segmental stone arches. The 6/6 double hung sash are set at the outer edge of reveals that are 1'7" deep on the inside. Interior walls are plaster over lathe. Flooring is 2½" oak, which in the large living room (originally a tavern area) and the original dining-room is laid in mitred fashion from center to corners. Woodwork is pine, and the main staircase, with turned newel post, is walnut.

Also on this farmstead is a full complement of outbuildings, the oldest of which was built in 1920. They include a barn, corncrib, granary, machine shed, grain bins, goat shed and chicken house. Two elements of interest are a stone oven, in the bluff NW of the house, and a brewery cellar located in the bluff on the east side of the stream which runs east of the house. The brewery cellar is set inside a natural cave and consists of a low barrel vault of stone.

At present, the total acreage of the Haberkorn farm is 240, occupying all of the SE4 of Section 15, and the S2 of the NE4 of this section. Since the primary area of significance of this property lies in the architectural merit of the farmhouse, it is not appropriate to include the entire acreage in this nomination. An area of 6 acres, bounded on the south by the gravel road adjacent to the farmstead, and running 3 acres east—west and two acres north—south, is sufficient to include the farmhouse, outbuildings, and a portion of the bluffs to either side, the latter acting as strong environmental features. Inclusion of the outbuildings is appropriate, because they are a principal element of the immediate surroundings, and because the Haberkorn house has historically been associated with a working farm. Inclusion of the bluffs is done to (a) recognize the particular natural setting of the farmstead, and (b) include the brewery cellar and the ruins of the stone oven.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

1870

The Haberkorn house is a well-preserved representative of a vernacular house type found, in Iowa, only in the northeast part of the state. The greatest concentration of this type is in the village of St. Donatus, in Jackson County, but other examples are scattered very thinly in other areas of this corner of Iowa. They have in common: rockfaced limestone construction, jerkinhead gable roofs, rectangular plans and two or more stories, and date from the middle decades of the 19th century (1850-70). As far as present knowledge goes, they were built by immigrants from west-central Europe, notably Luxembourg and southern Germany, and would appear to derive their architectural style from rural European traditions.

The Haberkorn house is among the larger known examples of this house type, and is distinctive also for its front-gable (rather than the more common side-gable) orientation. It was built in 1870 by George Haberkorn and his father, Adam, the latter a stonemason and brewer who came with his family to the Dubuque area from Bavaria in 1844. Adam worked in the area lead mines, but the family income was augmented by a small brewery (which according to family tradition dates from soon after Adam's arrival in this area) and the sale of bread baked by Eve Haberkorn in the stone oven near the farmhouse. Once the stone house was finished, its front room became a local tavern, and was also for many years during the 19th century the polling place for area residents.

Adam Haberkorn died in 1890, his son George in 1906. The farmstead remains in the hands of their descendants.
