DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Thomas Hanks House is situated in an older residential neighborhood within the city limits of Lawrenceburg. The small farming community is approximately fourteen miles south of Frankfort in what is primarily a rural county. The structure sits back from the main road, and can be viewed from that point only when the trees are not in full bloom.

Built ca.1858, the Hanks House is a two-story, three-bay, frame structure. The house is basically Greek Revival in style, has double sashed windows, two interior chimneys, and is covered by a standing seam roof.

The main portico is gabled, with square piers and a plain frieze. Four square piers, instead of columns, support the frieze, and they are echoed by semiprojecting piers on the facade. A second story balcony of Victorian iron railing projects from the front. The entrance element is simple with cornice molding and square piers. The door is encompassed by a transom and sidelights (photo1).

A two-story frame ell projects from the rear of the main block. It has a separate entrance on the east side with a connecting rear stair hall. The entrance portico is similar to that of the front with a double wooden gabled portico and square piers (see photos 2 and 3).

Incorporating a central-hall plan, the interior contains much of the original Greek Revival woodwork. Most of the trim consists of fluted pilasters with bull's eye corner blocks. The mantle in the right front parlor is metal and has been grained to look like marble (see photos 4 & 5). The remaining mantlepieces are metal, but much simpler in design.

Two outbuildings are included in the nomination. A twentieth century two-car garage and a small frame shed are both located to the rear of the main house.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Thomas H. Hanks House in Lawrenceburg achieves historical significance by its association with Thomas Holman Hanks, an important attorney and political figure in Anderson County, who built the house ca. 1858.¹

Hanks was born in Anderson County about a mile from Lawrenceburg on November 6, 1823. His father, Turner Hanks, had migrated to Kentucky in 1800 from Virginia where his father, George Hanks, had been killed as a soldier in the American Revolutionary War. This line of the Hanks family was distantly related to Abraham Lincoln through Lincoln's mother, Nancy Hanks. John Hanks, the forebearer of Lincoln, was the great uncle of Turner Hanks and his three bothers who came to Kentucky during pioneer days.

In 1849, when he was only twenty six years old, Hanks was elected as a member of the House of Representatives of the Kentucky General Assembly to represent Anderson County. During the years 1850-51 Hanks became a "Forty-Niner" in California but returned to Kentucky whereupon he was elected Circuit Court Clerk in 1856 and served in this position until 1862. During this time he also studied law and in 1863 was admitted to the Bar. He served as County Attorney from 1863 to 1867. Hanks became well known as an attorney and was retained on most of the important litigation of his county and circuit.

In 1881, 1886 and 1892 Hanks was elected to the lower house of the General Assembly and eventually became known as the "patriarch of the Kentucky legislature." He served in the legislature under three different state constitutions, was chairman of the committee on suffrages and elections, and was a most able, conscientious and indefatigable worker on other important committees. He represented Anderson County in the constitutional convention of 1890 and was a member of the house during the two succeeding sessions, when the most important legislative work of the state was accomplished.

Thomas Hanks was married in 1858 to Miss Margaret R. Myers, of Anderson County, and shortly thereafter built the two-story frame house on Woodford Street in Lawrenceburg.

 $^{1}\mathrm{Hanks}$ resided there until 1902 when it was sold to the Bond family.


