a pent roof between the first and second stories. The interior has extremely fine handcarved woodwork, moldings and mantels. The house is of virtually fire proof construction with 9 inch thick walls, interior walls of building tile and floors of poured concrete reinforced with steel.

structure was built in 1916 on ground which Mrs. Robinson acquired from her father's estate in 1915 after her marriage in 1914. The ownership of the land goes back to Abraham Blankenbaker. The name Blankenbaker Station refers to his ownership and the Interurban Station that stood at the bottom of the hill in the early 1900's. The home was purchased by Dr. & Mrs. John Price Jr. in 1923.

The house was designed by the Louisville architectural firm of Gray and Wischmeyer (1912-1917). George H. Gray (b.1874) studied at the Ecole des Beaux Arts and was married to Mary Belknap, sister of Mrs. Robinson. Hermann Wischmeyer (1875-1945) studied architecture in Germany and was a principal in a number of architectural firms.

The structural aspects of the house are significant in themselves as an early use of fire proofing in a residence. As a residence designed for a prominent Louisville family by an important architectural firm the house is a prime example of early twentieth century architecture in Jefferson County.
