DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Simpson County Courthouse is situated in the center of the town square in Franklin, Kentucky. With a population of approximately 6,553 Franklin is centrally located in this southern county within six miles of the Tennessee border. A turn-of-the-century church occupies the west side of the square, and commercial establishments comprise the other three sides.

Constructed in 1882, the courthouse is a two-story brick building embodying a cross-axial plan (see photo 1). The main facade is pierced by narrow windows with square brick hood molds. Brick pilasters divide the building vertically while a stone stringcourse encircles the structure at the second story level. On the east and west facades is a three-story projecting pavilion containing the entrances, each of which is sheltered by a shallow porch supported by Corinthian columns. Large, round-arched transoms surmount the double, glass-panelled doors (see photo 2). A Palladian window set within a segmental-arched corbelled recess pierces the upper portion of the pavillion and beneath it is a tripartite window arrangement. The dentilled cornice is accentuated by corbelled brick courses. Windows have stone lintels and sills. The north and south sides are four bays deep and contain tall, round-arched windows on the second level and straight-headed windows on the first floor. A clock tower rises from the tin, hipped roof.

One and one-half story brick wings which blend well with the 1882 design were added to the north and south sides in 1962. Although various minor alterations have been made, most of the interior remains intact (see photo 3).

The nominated property includes approximately three acres and comprises the entire courthouse lot.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Simpson County Courthouse in Franklin, Kentucky, is the town's most handsome late nineteenth century structure and ranks as one of the county's finest examples of Victorian architecture. The two-story brick structure serves as both the visual and physical focal point of the town as well as being the governmental center of the county.

Simpson County, Kentucky was formed in 1819 by the Kentucky General Assembly. It was created out of parts of Logan, Warren, and Allen Counties. It was the sixty-third county developed in the state and retains its original boundaries. It is situated in the extreme southern part of the state and is bounded on the north by Warren County, on the east by Allen County, on the west by Logan County, and on the south by the Tennessee state line. The county seat of Simpson County is the city of Franklin which was incorporated on November 2, 1820.

The first courthouse in Franklin was built in the center of the square in 1819. In 1860 this log house was torn down and a brick structure was erected on the same site. In May 1882, the courthouse burned. Shortly thereafter plans submitted by the McDonald Brothers for the construction of a new courthouse were accepted. The exterior of the building remains virtually unchanged since its construction. It retains the original clock and bell made by the McShane Bell Foundry-Henry McShane and Company, Baltimore Maryland in 1883. The bell has been used through the years to announce the opening of court sessions.

By 1962 the courthouse completed in 1883 had become inadequate for the county's needs, and resulted in the addition of wings on the north & south sides. On the first floor extra space was provided for the county court clerk, the county tax commissioner, and the circuit court clerk. On the second floor the north wing provided a new room which was used as a library and as a room for the court to conduct private discussions. Private quarters were also provided for the county judge.

The courthouse is the first of four structures in Franklin that are known to have been designed by the prestigious Louisville architectural firm of the McDonald Brothers. Other works of the McDonald Brothers in Franklin include the First Franklin Presbyterian Church (1886), the Franklin Female College (1889), and the 1893 Goodnight House (listed on the National Register August 12, 1977). From the 1870s into the twentieth century, the firm designed numerous buildings in the Louisville area and a substantial number of public buildings across the state and throughout the southeast. Besides the Simpson County Courthouse, the McDonald Brothers are responsible for the Adair, Bell (destroyed),

Boone, Carroll, Casey, Henry, Hickman, Laurel (destroyed in 1958), Trimble (rebuilt in 1953 based on the 1884 design), and Whitley (destroyed in 1931) County Courthouses, as well as numerous jails. All of these, with the exception of the 1875 Henry County building, were constructed in the 1880s and reveal a generally uniform plan and massing. The Simpson County Courthouse is almost identical in materials, plan, and detail to the 1885 Adair (listed in the National Register on August 27, 1974) and the 1884-85 Hickman (listed in the National Register on October 11, 1975) county buildings and bears a strong resemblance to the other McDonald Brothers courthouses. These similarities indicate that the firm established a standard courthouse form, of which the Simpson County structure was the prototype, and proceeded to employ that design with only slight modifications throughout Kentucky and the southeast region during the last quarter of the nineteenth century.
