DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Merchant's Hotel is located on the southeast corner of East Main and Columbia Avenue in downtown Campbellsville, Kentucky. Campbellsville (1970 pop. 7,598) is the seat of government for rural Taylor County, situated in the southcentral portion of the state. The hotel lies at the western terminus of the core of the late nineteenth-early twentieth century commercial section of Campbellsville (see photo 1).

Constructed ca. 1910, the Merchant's Hotel is a three-story brick structure resting on a stone foundation. Of note are the polygonal corner tower with conical roof and the recessed arched entrance with similar balcony on the Main Street (north) facade (see photo 2). The main entrance is set behind brick piers forming a rounded-arch colonnade, while the second floor balcony displays segmentally arched openings corresponding to the window arches (see photo 3). A three-bay block on the Main Street elevation is a full three stories; the southwestern section of the building is $2\frac{1}{2}$ stories with pedimented dormers.

The interior, which is currently being refurbished contains most of the original woodwork, consisting of multi-panel doors with transoms and cornice strips. The original mantels have been removed from the lobby, but have been replaced with similar period mantles and the original tile floor remains. The hotel now serves as a private residence with limited rental space.

The nominated acreage consists only of the building and the lot isoccupies.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Merchant's Hotel comprises an essential element within the overall streetscape of downtown Campbellsville, Kentucky. Occupying a key corner location, the hotel serves to anchor the western terminus of the historic commercial section of the town. While the building's height and scale harmonize with the streetscape, its location and various architectural components, i.e. the polygonal tower and the arcades, provide visual relief and diversity from the standard three-story Italianate and turn of the century commercial structures that line Main Street. In addition, the hotel played an important role in the commercial growth of Campbellsville in the early twentieth century, providing lodging and meals for traveling salesmen in the area and serving as the chief hotel in this county seat. The Merchant's Hotel was also a social nucleus for many of the Campbellsville residents.

Taylor County, Kentucky, was created by the General Assembly of Kentucky in 1848. Campbellsville, the county seat of Taylor County, was established circa 1815 by Andrew Campbell, one of the first settlers in this area. It was incorporated on January 3, 1817 and made the county seat by the General Assembly on February 20, 1850.

This building was constructed circa 1910. It was originally built by a corporation of which J. S. Breeding (1858-1933) was the president. This three-story, thirty-two room building was originally built by a group of Campbellsville merchants for the benefit of travelling salesmen who needed a place to stay overnight. In its heydey it was the town's leading hotel. The parlor on the second floor became a popular recreation spot. It contained a noted restaurant, and in many respects it was a social center. It was operated for several years after its most prominent years (1909-1935) by a couple affectionately known as "Uncle Walt" and "Aunt Mag" Hoskins who leased it to operate a rooming house.

By 1949 the hotel had seen its best days as a business establishment. From that time until 1976, it became somewhat dilapidated. However, efforts are presently being made to renovate it.
