DESCRIPTION:

December 1979

The J.C. Carlson House occupies a prominent position on the east side of County Road 30 on the eastern side of Rush City. The residence is situated on a hillside overlooking Rush Creek, the highway, and the rest of Rush City. A large lot sets off the house from the surrounding area of residences and commercial buildings; the Hillcrest Health Care Center is its nearest neighbor and is located immediately to the south.

The large two story Queen Anne house was constructed in 1899 according to plans by Augustus F. Gauger. It is irregular in plan and has a complex hip and gable roof pierced by three chimneys and modillions at the roof lines. The front (west) facade features a three story polygonal tower with windows on each side capped by a six sided conical roof and a wrap-around porch at the southwest corner with paired narrow columns and turned balusters. The gable end includes a large palladian window and a pent roof with a large three-part window at the second story. An elaborate entry with leaded glass transom and side lights is located at the southwest corner. Windows throughout are double hung with one over one lights. A two story bay is located on the south facade. The narrow clapboard siding is painted a creamy tan color and trimmed in white.

The house has been very well preserved. Exterior alterations are limited to small frame additions at the rear and the southeast corner and the fire escape on the front facade. The interior includes original woodwork, including a formal staircase, built-in dining room buffets, original lighting fixtures, and three fireplaces with imported English tile.

Other structures on the property include a red frame barn at the rear, a gazebo to the north, and a covered platform which was once part of a bridge across Rush Creek to the west.

The building housed the J.C. Carlson family until 1943. Since that time it has been utilized as a board and care home and a nursing home. The present owners, the Hillcrest Health Care Center, built the adjacent nursing home in 1967. They maintain the house for additional office space and conference rooms and the second floor for sleeping apartments. A complete set of architect's plans are in the possession of the Center.

SIGNIFICANCE:

The J.C. Carlson House is significant as the home of a leading entrepreneur in Chisago County's most important railroad center, Rush City, and as a well preserved Queen Anne house designed by St. Paul architect Augustus F. Gauger. J.C. Carlson first made permanent residence in Rush City in 1882. In 1895, he became president of the State Bank of Rush City, a position



he retained until his death in 1942. Carlson was a successful banker and prominent in local civic, political, and religious activites. He constructed a Queen Anne residence for his family home in 1899 and lived there until his death. The house was designed by the St. Paul architect Augustus F. Gauger, who was one of St. Paul's earliest and most prolific architects. He is known to have designed numerous schools, churches, commercial buildings, and residences in Minnesota, as well as several courthouses outside the state. The Carlson House, one of the few architect-designed residences in Chisago County, reflects the status and success achievable by a prominent leader in a successful railroad community at the turn of the century.


