DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

These are 2 of 28 Locomotive Gantry Cranes built by the McMyler Interstate Co. of Cleveland, Ohio in 1917.

The steam gantry cranes have a 15 ton capacity at 15 ft. radius, mounted on tracks, with holding and closing lines and clam shell buckets of 3/4 and 1 1/2 yard capacity. Provision is made for magnets at 35 ft. radius with portable electric power. In 1952 they were overhauled and the boilers replaced. They stand on four legs, and are approximately 40 ft. tall (TAMS 1952:20).

No known changes have been made to their appearance, and they still bear the original McMyler name plates.

The cranes are located on docks along the Delaware River at the Trenton Marine Terminal.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

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The Hog Island Cranes represent an important era of heavy hoisting equipment and played a major part in 20th century waterfront technology, in addition to aiding in the American efforts during World War I.

During the First World War the United States started a massive ship building effort. One of the largest yards created to meet this need was at Hog Island, just south of Philadelphia, started in 1917. Various technological innovations were made in creating this large enterprise, and were reported on in the technological literature of the period, Marine Review, September, 1918, Osgood 1919.

The McMyler Interstate Co., of Cleveland, Ohio was a major supplier of shipyard equipment at the time, and produced a number of machines for work in or near Philadelphia. Of special interest were the 28 locomotive steam gantry cranes built by the company specifically for the Hog Island Shipyard. These were oil burning, steam operated, but were reportedly capable of being converted to electric power (Webster 1920: 795).

The two 15 ton cranes at the Marine Terminal are 2 of the original 28. They were sold as surplus by the Government to the City of Trenton in 1930 for about \$5,000 (one fifth of their original cost), and in 1932 were installed at the Trenton Marine Terminal, where they have been ever since.

They are significant because they were made by an important and innovative manufacturer of Shipbuilding equipment, the McMyler Interstate Co. in 1917. They are 2 of 28 similar cranes made for and used at the Hog Island shipyards thus representing part of the World War I construction effort. The fate of other such cranes is not known but these two are representative of an important event, and of a major stage in waterfront technology. They also represent part of Trenton's effort to become a working seaport. They are unaltered and well preserved. The city of Trenton is planning to refurnish and maintain the cranes in their present environment.
