#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Occupying a 300-foot frontage on the 1200 block of East First Street, approximately a mile from the downtown center of Duluth, Chester Terrace is an imposing Romanesque Revival row house. Constructed in 1890 to provide twenty-five residential units ranging from one bedroom apartments to 2800 square foot townhouses, the principal facade appears as fifteen individual units with distinctive fenestration and ornamentation.

Chester Terrace is three stories in height and is constructed primarily of brick on a stone foundation. The front facade is highly articulated in architectural design treatment while the sides and rear of the structure are of unadorned brick (the sides being of red brick and the rear of low-quality buff brick). The front facade is embellished with a variety of false gables (which hide a sloped flat roof), curved bays and polygonal towers. Stone finials and copings surmount the gables. Ornamental cast-stone panels with ornate patterns highlight the pediments of the false gables. Polychrome and texture are given to the facade through the use of a dark rusticated stone on the first story, above windows as lintels on the second story, and as sills for the third story windows. The remainder of the masonry surface is a smooth, hard-surfaced red brick laid with butter-joints. Wooden elements such as porches and door and window trim are dark brown. Openings for doors and windows are of three types; flat (with lintels), segmental arched, or semi-circular arched.

Of the fifteen townhouses (facade divisions) eleven were originally designed as single-family units of three stories each with an open staircase between floors. These units have survived in a relatively intact state with original mantels, floors, oak woodwork and doors, and unaltered floor plan. The four remaining units, the units at each end and the two central units were converted into apartments during the early 1960s. The exterior of the building, however, remains unaltered from its 1890 appearance.

Builder/Architect Oliver Traphagen & Francis Fitzpatrick

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Chester Terrace is significant as an outstanding example of Romanesque Revival row house design in Duluth. It was designed by the important late nineteenth century architects Oliver Traphagen and Francis Fitzpatrick. Traphagen and Fitzpatrick are credited with the design of more than 50 substantial buildings in the Duluth area, many of which are executed in either the Romanesque or the Medieval style. Of these buildings, Chester Terrace, once known as a fine residential address, and Munger Terrace (listed on the National Register of Historic Places on December 12, 1976) were two of the major row houses erected in Duluth. The retention of original design integrity makes Chester Terrace exceptionally noteworthy, given the fact that it has functioned as a rental property since its construction in 1890.
