#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Josiah Parsons Homestead in Westport, Maine, consists of a post-colonial dwelling, a trading post of the Federal period, and a dolphin pool built in 1964.

The  $2\frac{1}{2}$ -story house, completed in 1792, is of frame (post-and-beam) construction with two internal end-chimneys, gable roof, shingle siding (clapboarded facade), and field-stone foundation. The facade, which faces east, is five bays wide with a central entrance. This entrance consists of a single panelled door flanked by Doric pilasters and surmounted by a 4-light transom; above this is an entablatured lintel with denticulated frieze. Fenestration today is 2/2, but would originally have been 9/6. The north and south sides of the house are two bays wide. Extending from the rear of the house is a  $1\frac{1}{2}$ -story shed-roofed ell with a single chimney and a door facing north, flanked by two 9/6 windows to the left and three to the right (along with a single sash 9-light window), Attached to the west of this side of the ell is a one-story, gable-roofed barn. The south side of the ell contains another door and windows in the first story, and four 9-light single sash windows in the half story.

The trading post, built c.1815, is a frame building of Cape Cod form with an asymetrically-placed central chimney, gable roof, and clapboard siding. Fenestration is 9/6. On the water side of the building are porches on two levels, supported by tall wooden posts. Many of the original interior store furnishings remain.

The oval dolphin pool is of concrete construction measuring horizontally 75 by 50 feet with a maximum depth of 10 feet.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Josiah Parsons House is a fine example of the rural Federal style and his trading post, of frame Cape Cod form, is significant as an early commercial building; the addition of the dolphin pool by the homestead's modern inhabitants demostrates the continuing importance and usefulness of this pioneer settlement.

Captain Josiah Parsons, "a Patriot of Bunker Hill", settled on Westport Island upon his return from the Revolutionary War. The York, Maine, native constructed his Federal style home in 1792 on what is now Greenleaf Cove. Certainly one of the finest homes on the island, that of Captain Parsons remains almost as it was in 1792 with fine architectural detailing throughout, including fireplaces, mantels, wainscoting, moldings, corner posts, curving bannister, stone hearths, etc. Local people reported that the parlor was so large that they could have "four squares" going when they danced there. The "keeping room" still has the removable panel in the north wall which was used to take a casket in and out of the house.

Parsons became the second largest landholder in Westport and, by 1815, operated the only store, or trading post on the island. The Trading Post, built over the water with a boathouse underneath, provided for the needs of the island inhabitants. The original counter, cash drawer, and store kerosene lanterns are still intact.

In 1964, scientist John C. Lilly, M.D., purchased the Parsons property and constructed a concrete pool which he and Mrs. Lilly used in the summer while conducting communication research with dolphins; the Trading Post became a laboratory for recording the human and dolphin sonic output. <u>Man and Dolphin</u> and <u>Mind of the Dolphin</u>, Dr. Lilly's books, led the <u>Washington Post</u> to call him "one of the most original and fascinating scientists of our time, when original, fascinating scientists are hardly a rarity. He is one of the pathbreaking explorers of that great terra incognita, the human brain."

Throughout its existence the Parsons Homestead has displayed its adaptive and useful nature and thus has served its inhabitants well.
