In 1905, the harness maker was T.J. McMullen. By 1911-1914, harness maker Joseph Mahowald occupied this building. (Cont.) Reason for significance: This building is distinctive not for its occupants but as one of two early brick-veneered frame commercial buildings which represent the first generation of substantial business blocks in the city of Grand Forks.

8.A. ... The east wall has a frame stair enclosure attached.

The first floor of the front (north) elevation of 205 DeMers Avenue has been completely remodeled in vitreolite, metal and plate glass. The second floor elevation features projecting brick drip moldings over the east and west windows. There is an apparently remodeled bay window in the center of this elevation. The third floor features projecting brick hood moldings with slightly flatter arches over the center windows than over the east and west windows. These hood moldings form a continuous banding across the elevation. Above them, varied brickwork suggests a frieze, brackets, and a dentilated cornice. The second and third story windows are six-over-one, double-hung. Aluminum storms and screens and infill have been added to the original windows. The accented window moldings, accented cornice of brick and bracketing suggest the Italianate commercial style.

All elevations of this building have brick laid in a stretcher bond. The side and rear elevations are undecorated. Windows on east and south elevations have segmented arched brick lintels and brick sills.

36. ...Between 1912-1916, the bay window was added to the second story front facade⁵ and the building was occupied by A.K. Skinner, photographer.⁶ During the late 1920s and early 1930s, a diamond shop and the Empress Cafe occupied the commercial space at 205 DeMers.⁷
