Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

Locust Hill is a Federal Style brick two-story house with a rectangular five-bay front with ell. It has a gable roof with a wide overhang and box cornice, brick dentils, and gable-end chimneys. Its 13" thick load-bearing, handmade brick walls, in a flemish bond, and painted white, sit on a brick foundation with a full basement. It has an asphalt gable roof, with a hip at the rear. A one-story porch, with shed roof, runs 3/4 of the length of both the front and north sides. It has nine turned spool-shaped posts with elaborate Eastlake trim, including square panels with a carved floral design, acorn pendants, and brackets. It has a railing with square balusters alternating with spool-shaped pieces and horizontal elements. A "pergola" (arch with vine-covered trellis) is located at the south side entrance to the library.

The main entrance at the center of the front facade is double leaf, single light doors, with moulded trim and transom. There are three other entrances at the rear, the main one being double leaf, each with 14 lights, side windows and transoms. All windows are 2-over-2 sash with green shutters.

INTERIOR

Two original mantels survive; one on the first floor, which is Adamesque; and one on the second floor, which is a more simple Federal-style mantel. They are hand-carved by a local craftsman, Andrew Braden. Two other later mantels, one Classical revival and the other Victorian, have repalced the originals. Walls are horeshair plaster over lath. Window and door casings, and baseboards, are moulded, and chairrails are found in several rooms.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Locust Hill is significant as one of the earliest remaining residences in Tuscumbia, as the home of a noted local politician, and as the home of a local author and artist. Constructed in 1823 for a planter and his wife, William Hooe and Catherine Winter, it is noted for its use of Flemish bond brick on two faces (west and south) and its fine Adamesque mantels, reputedley crafted by Andrew Braden, a local cabinet maker. Later a fine Eastlake veranda was added to the house.


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In 1823 William and Catherine Winter from Prince William County, Virginia constructed this fine house. It served as the headquarters of General Florence N. Cornyn (USA) in 1863. In 1865 it was acquired by Capt. John Taylor Rather, and repaired as a residence. Rather was an early Alabama settler and politician, serving as deputy sheriff of Madison County in 1812, and 1815. In 1820 he was elected a representative for Morgan County in the state legislature and was re-elected nine times. In 1835 he was chosen a member of the state senate and in 1841 ran for congress as a Whig. In 1865, he was commissioned to represent Morgan County in the Reconstruction convention. Rather occupied the house with his son, General John Daniel Rather, also a noted politician. The younger Rather served in both houses of the state legislature both before and after the Civil War. He also served as Vice-president and President of the Memphis and Charleston Railroad. The house remained in the Rather family until 1978 when Mary Wallace Kirk, a locally noted author and artist and the granddaughter of General Rather, died.


