Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Holman House is unaltered from its original appearance. It is a two story Neo-Classical Revival sturcture of imposing dimensions. The rectangular shaped building consists of a central block approximately 62 feet square. Porches stretch across the front, left and right elevations of the house. A porte-cochere is found on the right elevation. A central two-story portico has four Corinthian columns supporting an entablature and pediment. Zinc modilions ornament the cornice which is constructed of galvanized iron. An elaborately ornamented oval window is located in the center of the pediment. An almost identical portico with corresponding embellishments is situated on the house's left elevation. The porticos on both the front and left elevations are accented by balconies with wrought iron railings. The fenestration on the front elevation is symetrical. French windows open onto the porch on either side of the front entrance. Casement windows are located above the French windows on the second floor. Two French windows with casement windows above are also on the house's right side elevation. Semi-circular fanlights are above each of the French windows. One-over-one double sash windows are found throughout the remainder of the house. Casement windows with transoms surround the sleeping porch at the left rear of the house.

A back porch projects from the main structure and is surrounded by a dressing room, bathroom, kitchen, pantry, breakfast room and storeroom. The first floor of the Holman House consists of a central hall and adjacent stairhall flanked by a children's room. family bedroom and library on the left and dining room and salon on the right. The stairhall entrance is flanked by two Corinthian columns. Beveled glass and fine woodwork are used throughout the house. The dining room is noteworthy for its skeleton wainscotting and art or stained glass window. Other outstanding features of the dining room are the plate rail and mantel with cabinet above. The cabinet has a mirrored back and the doors are fashioned from beveled glass. A stained glass window flanked by two smaller stained glass windows is found above the stair landing between the first and second floors. A mantel in the library has raised likenesses of a horse and mule-symbolic of Mr. Holman's business.

The second floor is divided by a central hall corresponding to the one downstairs. On the left are two bedrooms, a dressing room, bath and a sleeping porch. On the right are three bedrooms and a bath. The house has an attic and full basement.

All rooms in the house have a stenciled border around the ceiling. Every room has a different stencil pattern. An unusual amount of stencil detail may be seen in the salon on the first floor. Stencil work is used in a panel format on the salon walls.

All the original light fixtures and hardware are still in the house. It is of weatherboard construction and has a hipped, tiled roof.

The Holman House is situated on a spacious lot measuring 250' south, 490' west, 230' north and 450' east--for a total of 2.58 acres. The lot fronts on Broad Street and borders on Mutual Street on the west. Only one outbuilding, a dove cote, is located on the property.

8. Significance



Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

ARCHITECURE: The house is one of the finest examples of the Neo-classical Revival style applied to a large residence in the Wiregrass section of Alabama. The largest and most elaborate residence in that section of the state, it was an extremely modern building that featured steam heating and the area's first central vacuuming system.

<u>COMMERCE</u>: The house is associated with Jessee DeCosta Holman, a prominent businessman who made his fortune as a mule and horse trader and later acquired a Buick dealership and the Ozark Cotton Mills, one of the first mills in the Wiregrass and the first in Ozark.

Jesse DeCosta Holman was born in Ozark, Alabama January 3, 1872 and died in Atlanta, Georgia November 17, 1960. He was the son of one of the first doctors to serve Dale County. He entered the livestock business in the early 1890s by selling a mule obtained from his father, Dr. J. C. Holman. This operation blossomed into a successful business venture in several towns throughout Southeast Alabama and Southwest Georgia, a business which Mr. Holman was to continue for almost fifty years. His other business interest included a Buick dealership and the Ozark Cotton Mills.

His house was designed by Montgomery architect C. Frank Galliher. The contractor was Mr. H. N. Hunter of Ozark and an all black crew built the house. The main carpenters electricians, mason, etc., were members of the Boykin family, which is still active in the builders trade today. Construction begin in early 1912 and the family moved into the house on March 13, 1913. Tradition maintains that the house was built for approximately \$75,000. The grounds were landscaped by Wagner Park Nursery Company, a landscape architect from Sidney, Ohio.

In 1924, the Methodist Episcopal Church held its annual conference in Ozark. Arrangements were made for Bishop W. A. Candler to stay in the Holman house during the conference. Bishop Candler held business meetings upstairs each morning before going to the church for the general session. This is an ideal situation because the Holman house was only two blocks from the church.

The house has remained in the Holman family. It is presently owned by Mr. Jesse Dowling Adams and his wife Ann Morris Adams. Mr. Adams is the grandson of J. D. Holman. The house is presently undergoing an extensive restoration for use as a private residence and commercial establishment.
