STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE: their agricultural products. In terms of <u>commerce</u> and <u>agriculture</u>, this building is significant for serving as a central market place for local agricultural products. Because of its location just off the town square, convenient to other local businesses, the market contributed to the economy of downtown Clarkesville. This kind of symbiotic activity helped Clarkesville, like other Georgia communities, weather the Depression. In terms of <u>architecture</u>, the building is significant as a good example of one type of W.P.A. building found throughout Georgia. W.P.A. buildings in Georgia generally fall into one of three categories - high style, usually found in the larger cities; rustic, found in smaller towns and parks; and utilitarian, usually found in small towns. The market, like the addition to the local high school (in the South Washington Street Historic District), belongs to the latter category.
