Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Aitken barn sits immediately east of U.S. Highway 95 on the Little Salmon River just south of Riggins, Idaho. It is a rectangular, balloon-frame structure built on a basilica plan, with one-story lean-tos on either side of a two-story central section which is elongated and hip-roofed at the rear of the barn.

The clerestory wall of the hayloft is perforated by three small square windows. The lean-to sections contain stalls, for horses on one side and milk cows on the other. The walls of these sections are unfenestrated but contain solid secondary entrance doors.

At the main entrance, a boxed hay hood sits over a shed-roofed wagon porch where a load of hay could be protected overnight in uncertain weather. A rectangular cupola with front-facing gables and slatted sides is centered on the ridge beam.

The Aitken barn is architecturally signficant as an exceptional owner-built example--no better one has been identified in Idaho at our present stage of inventory--of the basilica type of barn construction, in a location which makes it exceptionally visible to travelers on Idaho highways.

The barn is large, handsome, unaltered and reasonbably well-preserved. In the manner of functionally-designed agricultural structures, its exterior forms imply the various agricultural purposes of hay storage and stock shelter for which it ws planned and built. Moreover, despite its scale and complexity of plan, it is the product not of professional but of amateur barn-builders. It was designed during World War I by Jim Aitken and constructed by him, with the assistance of his son Stewart, from lumber hauled in by wagon from the town of New Meadows thirty miles to the south.

The location of the barn immediately on Highway 95, the only north-south arterial in the state of Idaho, has made it landmark to travelers approaching Riggins along the Little Salmon River, and immediately accessible to those with an interest in vernacular architecture.
