Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Eastlake/early Queen Anne style Roscoe Hersey House is an irregular plan 18 room structure with multiple projecting bays and a richly detailed surface treatment. The house is an excellent example of a style made possible by machine-produced decorative woodwork - in this case a St. Croix Valley lumberman's dream in local white pine.

A dominant feature of the house are its gable-roofed two-story bays. There are rectangular bays on the front (east) facade, on the north and south sides, and off the southeast corner. Most have tall, narrow windows, often grouped in threes. Decorative friezes run below the windows. A north-side bay encloses the stairwell and houses an 8' x 12' stained glass window showing a natural scene. Sawn scroll brackets, fluted porch columns, diagonal and vertical side panels, and cutout porch friezes virtually dominated the clapboard siding of the house. The interior is finished in cherry and butternut. The floral and faunal motifs of the stained glass window are carried over in carved woodwork. Built-in buffet, cabinets, and six tiled fireplaces add to the design. A 1926 fire destroyed the attic story of the dwelling. Originally the bays extended another ½-story; several had hip roofs with matching hip dormers. The southeast corner bay was gabled. Its woodwork matched the front porch gable. The south side bay retains a one level bay window, originally topped by a railed porch. The front bay, recessed in the central front porch, originally was a $3\frac{1}{2}$ -story tower and belvedere. While reconstruction altered the roof line, from the eaves down the house is virtually unchanged. It remains one of the city's outstanding houses.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Roscoe Hersey played an important role in the early development of Stillwater's lumber and mercantile development. His house reflects the commercial success of the Hersey-Staples partnership, the strong link between the St. Croix Valley and Maine capital and personalities, and the boom years of Stillwater's lumber years. Roscoe Hersey was the eldest son of Samuel F. Hersey, Isaac Staples financial partner. Samuel Hersey stayed in Bangor, Maine, while Staples set up the firm of Hersey, Staples and Company in Stillwater in 1851. Roscoe Hersey moved to Minnesota in 1867, after serving in the Civil War at the age of 26 to look after his family's interest in Minnesota business. He took charge of the Lake City branch of the Hersey, Staples and Co. In 1872 he moved to Stillwater and entered the firm of Hersey, Bean and Brown, a land, lumber, merchandise firm. In 1878 he was elected and served one term as a state senator. Hersey built the house in 1879-1880 and occupied it for seven years. It was then sold to John G. Nelson in 1887, another lumberman, who sold it in 1900 to James E. McGrath, also a pioneer St. Croix Valley lumberman.
