Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Fontanelle Township Hall is located in the unincorporated village of Fontanelle, a community on the western border of Washington County overlooking the Elkhorn River.

The hall is a one-story, two-bay, 27 x 19 foot brick structure. The gable roof is covered with wooden shingles, and the entrance is located on the gable end. The Eastlake porch across the front (west) is decorated with turned posts and brackets. There are two windows at the rear and one each on the other sides; all are double-hung with two-over-two panes. A centered interior chimney is located at the rear.

On the interior, the one-room is divided in half by a low railing (see photos #4, #5, and #6). Polling booths are located along the east wall. An old heating stove remains centered on that wall. Wooden tongue-in-groove wainscotting is placed on all four walls. The original furnishing of chairs, table, and desk remain in the hall; the law books and voting records date to 1894.

The hall was purchased from the township by the present owner in 1975 to insure its preservation. It is maintained in its original state, and is opened occasionally to the public for special tours.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Fontanelle Township Hall is a well-preserved example of a somewhat uncommon building type in Nebraska: the township meeting hall. These halls were the product of a particular type of county organization. A minority of Nebraska counties were organized by township. The township organization instituted local control of certain phases of government work, and is therefore significant to the governmental history of the state.

In 1883 a law passed the Nebraska Legislature authorizing the organization of townships as governmental units, after voter approval at the county level (Laws of Nebraska, 1-83, pp. 202-217). This allowed rural residents a direct voice in decisions at the local level. Previously, decisions on rural matters were made by the county government. The 1883 law gave certain governing and taxing powers to the township government. Through annual town meetings, direct democracy was practiced. At the annual meetings, the voters made rules and policies, elected a town board and their county supervisor, set taxes, and made decisions on work to be done in the coming year on specifically authorized projects, such as roads, bridges, support of the poor, public wells, trees along highways, fire protection, etc.

Washington County adopted this law the same year, and five townships were organized in the next twelve months. The Fontanelle voters held their first annual meeting on April 1st, 1884. The meetings were held in the schoolhouse, and five voters constituted a quorum. In 1896 the voters approved the construction of a town hall. A number of township men assisted in the construction of the building, and H. J. Carpenter, a prominent local farmer, was paid thirty dollars for overseeing the work. The total cost of construction, lot purchase, and printing was \$563.35 (Fontanelle Township Minutes, n.d., 1896).

The interior clearly reflects the uses of the building: meeting hall and polling place. Half of the room provides seating for voters at the annual meeting. The other half houses polling booths, desk, and table for the annual meeting, quarterly meetings of the board, and voting.

Few other township halls have been identified in the Nebraska Historic Buildings Survey to date. Only twenty-eight of Nebraska's 93 counties have adopted the township organization. In township counties, most meetings were probably held in schoolhouses or other available rooms. This may account for the resemblance to one-room schoolhouses. Of the three other known halls, all are similar to Fontanelle's (one room, gable roof, front porch, and entrance at the gable end), although they are of frame construction. The Fontanelle Township Hall is particularly well-preserved, and is the only known example in brick.
