Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The North Berwick Woolen Mill is a typical New England mill complex of the mid-nineteenth century: a large, oblong, and multi-bayed brick section with pavilioned stairwells; a decorative belfry; small or attached ancillary sections, and a detached smokestack. All units are in good to excellent condition.

The main section (Mill No.1) is three-and-one-half stories tall, seven bays long three to four bays deep, and has a pitched roof. Pavillioned stairwells occupy the center bays of both long sides. The facade stairwell is taller and has a decorative Italianate-Gothic belfry with fencing of an almost neo-Colonial character. The six small roof dormers flanking the tower (seven on the river side) are also strongly Colonial in feeling, but both features are pictured on an 1880 lithograph of the mill and appear to have been original. The window bays are typically divided by brick pilasters, but each pilaster is capped by a Doric capital and the eaves fitted with an entablature. The main tower is similarly decorated with Greek Revival pilasters, and also has a broad brick entablature. Virtually all windows are the original 6/6, the dormer windows are original 8/8's. A square smokestack that originally stood at one gable end was removed sometime in the early twentieth century.

Adjoining the south gable end of the main section is a simpler, three-story section (Engine & Picker House) with flat roof. Two stories of this section pre-date 1880, when they had a slightly-curved roof. The window bays of this section are not divided by pilasters, nor does other decoration exist.

Another four-story section (Mill No. 2), similarly undecorated and with its original curved roof, stands flush with the small section and adjoins the main section only at a rear corner. This section is closest to the river. It too pre-dates the 1880 drawing, and retains its original 6/6 windows.

A third addition (Finishing Room), matching the described small section but attached to the opposite gable end of the main building, was added much later, probably in the early twentieth century. Its window bays are divided by simple pilasters, and it has a flat roof. In its gable end are cut large fixed windows. A doorway occupies the center bay of the facade.

A two-and-one-half story wooden building (date uncertain, but pre-1880), stands detached from the mill behind the ancillary wings. Beside this, sprouting from a small, free-standing boiler-room, stands a very tall octagonal smokestack with a bulbous rounded cap (c. 1880-95).

The interior spaces are large open rooms with no decorative or major period features. The only piece of machinery which survives is a huge rusting, steam engine in the basement. This was retained as a backup in case the water-power failed.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Woolen Mill at North Berwick is the only major mill structure in the Berwick area, and is one of the more stylistically eclectic of Maine's numerous rural Woolen mills. Although constructed in 1862, the mill incorporates Italianate, Greek Revival, Gothic Revival, and even some neo-Colonial stylistic features.

A woolen mill was first constructed on the site in 1834, and operated until about 1862, when it was destroyed by fire and the present building erected. It is possible that the later mill mimics stylistic features of the original, hence the reactionary detail (no descriptions of the earlier structure are known to exist). The present building coincided with a contract to produce blankets for the Union Army, which markedly increased the scale of operations. The earlier mill had been the first in the nation to produce machine-made blankets.

The mill operated until the late 1950's. It has recently been purchased by a company which manufactures trade show exhibits.
