Highland Road District Description

The Highland Road District, located northeast of the South Hampton Town Center adjoining the Kensington Town Line, retains its late eighteenth and early nineteenth century rural character.

Included within this district are intact examples of Georgian and Federal period architecture constructed in wood and sited on undivided agricultural acreage. Initial agricultural development patterns survive as do five Georgian, and three Federal style farm dwellings, and associated agricultural outbuildings.

Of particular note are the district's maintained, open vistas which extend south from Highland Road.

Within the area are also located three non-residential structures which maintain the district's design character and respect the historical, rural landscape.

The Highland Road District

The Highland Road District is significant as an intact group of Georgian and Federal farm structures which retain the architectural and visual integrity of an eighteenth century agricultural district. Most of these dwellings retain significant portions of their original acreage; thus, initial agricultural development patterns survive, along with five Georgian and three Federal style farm dwellings, and associated agricultural outbuildings. Of particular note are the districts' maintained open vistas which extend south from Highland Road. The three modern dwellings within the district do not obtrude on its overall character.

As in the case of many of South Hampton's dwellings originally constructed as part of agricultural complexes, Highland Road area dwellings are simplified adaptations of more sophisticated architectural forms. Proportion, scale, and materials are the primary mediums of style. Architectural ornamentation is minimal and frequently confined to central points of focus such as entries.

Illustrating a textbook contrast between the Georgian and Federal styles are the Murphy House (Site 4) a c. 1730 Georgian style dwelling, and the Berry House (Site 3) a c. 1800 Federal dwelling. Though similar in basic, symmetrical composition, these structures dramatically illustrate the transition in proportion and detail from the robust forms associated with Georgian architecture to the more refined, Adam-influenced, Federal style.

Original, low density, rural development patterns have been retained providing remarkably intact evidence of the area's early appearance. The integrity of the district is further enhanced through active cultivation of agricultural acreage.

NAME: The Highland Road District

VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION: The Highland Road District is bounded on the northeast by the Kensington town line. This northeast border encompasses Site 3 (6-13), Site 4 (6-14), Site 6 (6-16), Site 12 (6-19) and Site 14 (6-20). Commencing at the northeasternmost corner of Site 14 (6-20), the district boundary proceeds south to a point perpendicular with the mid-line of Highland Road at its intersection with Locust and Amesbury Roads. Turning northwest, the district boundary proceeds along the mid-line of Highland Road to a point perpendicular to the northeast corner of Site 10 (6-39). The boundary turns southwest to encompass the east and south perimeter of Site 10 (6-39) to its intersection with the property line of Site 8 (6-40). The boundary then traces the irregular southern property line of Site 40 to its point of intersection with Woodman Road. Proceeding northeast along the mid-line of Woodman Road, to the mid-point of its intersection with Highland Road, tracing the mid-line of Highland Road west to a point perpendicular to the southwest corner of Site 3 (6-13). The district boundary turns north to intersect with the Kensington/South Hampton town line, then proceeds east along the town line to its point of origin.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION: The boundaries of the Highland Road District were established to encompass significant Georgian and Federal settlement. The boundaries of this unusually intact area are defined by public roadways, one town border and largely intact historic property divisions. Included within the boundaries are undeveloped agricultural acres fronting Highland Road. Owing to the topography of the district, these undeveloped areas are visible from any point in the district.

ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

The Mignosa house is a 2½-story federal farmhouse, with a medium-pitched roof and symmetrical fenestration. The architectural details have been obscured by the application of aluminum siding, doors, and shutters. A two and one-half story ell with a gable roof, topped by a narrow chimney with corbeled cap, has a hip-roof enclosed porch to the north and a garage to the west. While the main block has a granite slab foundation, the ell, porch, and garage have concrete blocks and are newer additions.



ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Parts of this Georgian I house date back to c. 1760. However, since that time the house has been burned twice and rebuilt. Its main features include: a six-panel center-entry door; a 40 pane window with two 15 pane windows on each side, c. 1960; a low-pitched roof topped by a central chimney with a corbeled cap; and on the front facade, a three-bay open porch with a shed-roof. Other features include: a simple molded cornice; fieldstone foundation; a one-and one-half story ell with a gable-roof; and to the east, an open porch with a shed roof.





ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

A pleasant example of the Georgian half house, the main features of this two and one-half story structure include: a six-panel door with a transom containing three lights; six-over-six windows; a medium-pitched roof with a simple boxed cornice on the lateral eaves; and a granite slab foundation. Other features of the main block may have been obscured when aluminum siding was installed. Features of the connecting rear ell include: a gable roof; a small central chimney; clapboard siding; and a fieldstone foundation. A two car garage is attached. The barn has a steeply pitched gable roof which is topped by a four sided cupola, each side containing a window with a pyramidal hip roof.

RELATED STRUCTURES AND CONTEXT:

Three large oaks on the front, west side behind a wooden stackade fence. A large clapboard barn with cupola, sliding doors, and stone foundation.

BOUNDARY AND ACREAGE DESCRIPTION:

Twenty-four and one-half acres bounded on the north by Highland Road, east-Spencer, Blinn, Sanborn, and Lariviere, south-Unknown, and west-Daigle and Mignosas.

REFERENCES:

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (Evaluation & Historical Associations):

Built in 1755 this house is one of two examples of the Georgian half-house style in South Hampton. Formerly known as the Spencer farm, the house with its large barn and 24 acres of land is a reminder of South Hampton's agricultural past and is worthy of preservation.



ADDITIONAL ARCHITECTURAL AND STRUCTURAL DESCRIPTION:

Boxlike in appearance, with a large central chimney, the Towle house is utilitarian in nature. Its main features include: a central entry door with raised panels, a transom with four lights; and plain pilasters supporting a full entablature. Other features are: nine over six windows on the first story and six over six on the second story, all with plain surrounds; projecting lateral eaves with exposed rafters; close raking eaves with fascia; and narrow, plain cornerboards. A one story gable-roof ell to the north has the same siding and cornice treatment as the main block, and is supported by a fieldstone foundation.




The Berry house is a 2½-story, twin chimney, Federal style structure. The center entry door is flanked by sidelights and surmounted by a semi-elliptical louvered fan. Flanking the sidelights are fluted pilasters rising to a full entablature. All windows are six-over-six with architrave trim, and the front facade windows are framed by shutters. Cornice treatment consists of close raking eaves and molded lateral eaves.

There is a small 1-story, enclosed porch on the south elevation.

There is a 2-story, gable-roofed ell which consists to the garage, which might, upon further inspection, prove to pre-date the main block.

This self-contained Georgian style three quarter house is characterized by its lack of surface detail and classical ornamentation. Its main features include: a six panel door with glass in the upper two panels; a full entablature over the door supported by pilasters; a plain boxed cornice; and a large central chimney with a corbelled cap.
