The Miller House is significant by its association with Mary Miller, founder of Lafayette. Without her foresight that coal was a valuable asset and should be extracted, her division of the family farm into a townsite, and her charitable donations to the town and coal mining families, the community would not exist. Mary Miller died in 1921, her home remaining as a testament to her vision for the coal town of Lafayette.

Lafayette and Mary Miller, arriving in Colorado in 1863 from Iowa, homesteaded 160 acres near Burlington. By the following year, he purchased a stage station along the Overland Trail which served as the main link between Denver and Cheyenne. The Millers operated the station for seven years, moving to the present site of Lafayette in 1871. Here the couple began an agricultural operation, only to move again, this time to the city of Boulder in 1874. Four years later, Lafayette died and was buried at his farm.


Returning to agricultural pursuits, Mary Miller soon became interested in the possibility of coal deposits on her property. Since 1859, coal had been mined at Marshall and it was assumed by many that the veins of the black mineral ran throughout the area. In 1884,

corner of the east side of the building. Window openings are a variety of rectangular shapes and are metal framed sliders. A barn with narrow wooden clapboard siding is located at the northwest corner of the site, and a metal shed is directly adjacent to the south. Lyons sandstone walkways are located on the property.

a 14-foot vein was encountered on the Miller farm which by this time numbered 1280 acres and was considered one of the best farms in the county. Under a lease agreement with John Simpson in 1887, the first shaft was sunk on the Miller land and mining commenced in the area.

Being an enterprising individual, Miller recognized the need for homes for the future coal miners and in 1888 platted a 150-acre townsite called Lafayette, after her late husband. The following year, the community was surveyed, and in 1890, incorporated. During these years, the late 1880s, she erected her home at 409 Cleveland, approximately in the center of her future community.

Miller was a strong leader. Her abhorrence of alcohol lead to a clause in every deed forbidding the sale of spirits east of Highway 287. She contributed heavily to the fund which established the congregational Church. She was also responsible for the Lafayette Bank, or Miller Bank as it was commonly called, and was the only woman bank president in the United States in 1902. The bank's eventual failure in 1914 was partically due to her support of the striking mines.

Despite the application of siding, the house retains its original form and detailing. As the residence of the founder of the community, who was also responsible as well for the development of the coal industry in Lafayette, the house has tremendous historical significance for the town.
