



STATEMENT

This building appears to have been strongly influenced by Louis Sullivan, particularly his small midwestern works. Windows are grouped in broad bands at the center of the bold, geometric facade, the floors separated by a wide enriched spandrel panel. In typical Sullivanian fashion, intricate, foliated ornaments of low relief is concentrated at severely classical entrance architraves, wall panels and cornice. This local expression of Sullivan's distinctive and important style is nicely executed and well preserved.

FICANCE

The Democrat Building is associated with the post-1900 success of the Davenport Democrat Company. A short time after this building was constructed, the Democrat was purchased by the Lee Nwspaper Syndicate. The Democrat's evolution was typical of the trend towards merger of small, independent firms under larger corporations.

DESCRIPTION

<u>(</u>

The <u>Davenport Democrat</u> began as the <u>Democratic Banner</u> in 1848. It was edited along Democratic party views, its success varying with the success of the party. D.N. and J.J. Richardson were the <u>Democrat's</u> successful publishers beginning in the 1860's. The <u>Democrat</u> purchased its competitor, the <u>Gazette</u>, in 1887 and the <u>Evening Leader</u> in 1902. In c. 1915 the Lee Newspaper Syndicate took over the merged <u>Democrat and Leader</u>, ending its reign as a local independent news voice.
