Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

Situated on a rise approximately one mile from the Ohio River, the Elijah Herndon House is a single-story building with a one-story ell of brick construction. The main block is twenty feet wide by forty feet long while the ell is seventeen feet wide by fifteen feet long. Flemish bond brickwork enhances the facade while the sides and rear walls are executed in common bond with a row of headers every five rows. The house is five bays wide with center entrance with four-pane transom. All bays on the main block have jack-arch lintels and limestone sills and windows are 2/2 pane. Two single stack, interior gable-end chimneys straddle the ridge on either side of the main block, while the ell features an exterior gable-end chimney, eight feet long. The building rests on a limestone foundation. The gable roof is tin and in fair condition. Cast-iron tie rods anchored by cast-iron star-shaped holders at each gable end reinforce the house.

The interior of the house remains intact. The entrance hall is flanked by single rooms, which are of equal size, with fireplaces centered in the north and south walls. The Federal style mantels with intricate fanlight carvings are original to the dwelling. The rear single-room ell, constructed at the same time as the main block, has floor to ceiling wall presses enhanced with intricate moldings and a huge fireplace and served as the kitchen.

Structurally, the house has been altered by a single-story one-room frame addition on the south side of the ell.

Outbuildings associated with the house have been torn down.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Elijah Herndon House, constructed ca. 1820, is significant for its historical associations with the early development of Campbell County, created in 1794 and the nineteenth county organized in the Commonwealth. The house is an outstanding example of Federal-style architecture, and is one of three Federal houses documented in the comprehensive survey of the county. In addition, it is significant for the excellence of its craftsmanship and detailing.

Elijah Herndon was one of the early settlers of Campbell County and came to this region before 1800. Deed records indicate that he purchased one hundred-thirty acres of land in 1806 which were a part of a land grant surveyed for William Kennedy in 1787.

He served in the War of 1812. In 1813, he enlisted in Captain Squire Grant's Company of the Fourth Regiment of Kentucky Mounted Volunteer Militia, and served as Second Sargeant. His regiment under the command of General William Henry Harrison fought in the battle of the Thames.

In 1818 he built the one-story brick Federal style house on a rise overlooking Washington Trace Road which was one of the first roads between Covington in Kenton County and Washington in Mason County. The bricks were burned at a kiln situated in Minter, a small community on the banks of the Ohio River, and approximately one mile from Herndon's homesite.

Elijah Herndon lived here until his death in 1849. The house and farm remained in the Herndon family until 1972 when the property was purchased by the present owners who plan to restore the house.

Architecturally, the house is similar in construction to the many Federal-style houses found in central Kentucky, and the outstanding craftsmanship and detailing of the Herndon house equals those in the Bluegrass Region. Elijah Herndon grew up on his father's farm in Scott County in the heart of central Kentucky, and no doubt he was influenced by the architectural style of this region as is evidenced by his house. The Herndon House is one of three Federal houses documented in the county.

and extends 200' northeast to the frontage of Washington Trace Road, 100' southeast to the farm lane, 100' southwest, and 100' northwest. No outbuildings associated with the house exist today.
