could be sold except the dower and the Woodlawn, a grove of Walnut trees he had planted in front of the house.

Small tracts of the farm were sold to Edward S. Monohon, who had purchased the adjoining farm of Theodore's brother Arthur (JF-311). When Theodore Brown's widow, Susan P.M. Brown died in 1917, she left her estate to her four unmarried daughters for as long as they remained unmarried. In 1920 the house and "Woodlawn" that went with it were sold to Edward S. Monohan and remains in the Monohan family.
