18. pattern which continues throughout the structure. A stone cornice accented by modillions and dentils runs above the second story. The third story is also finished in stone, with quoining at the corners which continues through the next five stories. A water table above the third story is embellished by talon molding. Above the eighth story, another stone water table has egg and dart molding. The stories above the third are finished in red brick. An extended cornice above the tenth story has modillions and dentils and is surmounted by a row of antefixae. A one and one-half story attic level is above.

The main entry is centrally located in the original portion of the building. The round-arched doorway is flanked by monumental, paired columns. The entry is topped by a balustrade adorned with swags and urns.
