Description

The theatre consists of four rectangular shaped units: the lobby, auditorium, dressing rooms and backstage. Two stories in height, the building is three stories in the rear backstage area. The structure is most likely wood frame with a common stretcher bond brick veneer on the three non-public facades. Four exits are located on the rear wall, while the side facades remain unarticulated. The terra-cotta-faced front facade presents a lively public side of the theatre. Finally a wooden truss system spans the auditorium area.

Divided into three bays, the front facade has a recessed, central entrance covered with a metal marquee. The flanking bays have large, plate glass windows. On the second floor are three windows placed centrally within each bay. A recessed panel decorates each bay of the cornice area and a sign outlining the word "Orpheum" appears again in the molded terra-cotta.

On the interior the lobby has marble wainscoting and simple tile floors. The auditorium has a balcony and murals decorate the ceiling and freize areas. The building has undergone some re novation work and seats have been replaced and new heating, lighting and sound systems installed. In addition, other work included remodeling the stage and backstage, new stairs to the stage gridiron, new sprinkler system, new fire curtain and new restrooms. The lobby has been restored. Unfortunately, early remodeling efforts painted over a portion of the murals located above the dado. Two shop areas, now converted to a business office and storage area, flanked the central lobby.

The theatre is the earliest & best preserved theatre in the city. The terra-cotta exterior and interesting blend of classical and prairie motifs remains in near original condition.

Significant in the areas of theatre and architecture, the Orpheum Theatre is the oldest remaining theatre in the city. In addition, the terra-cotta facade is a fine example of the severe, yet pleasing classical style employed in commercial structures. While white terra-cotta was intended to imitate the more costly granite and marble used in Neo-Classical structures, the material was so pliable it lent itself to more three-dimensional ornamental details such as garlands and molded trim. This can be seen in the decorative panels and egg-and-dart molding of the cornice.

The theatre was constructed over three months and opened on October 6, 1913 according to one source. Another gives the construction date as 1905, which seems to be verified by the architectural details. Both sources agree that the theatre was built for F. J. and L. J. Solari. In 1919 the building was sold to Finklestein and Reuben, a major theatre management firm, who employed Fred Beecher as general manager. J. J. Liebenberg was a major Midwestern theatre architect who did many commissions for Finklestein and Reuben and therefore it is surmised that he worked on the building at this time. From 1913 (or 1905) to 1927 the Orpheum was a vaudeville theatre, which booked acts from New York and Chicago. Performers for these variety, dramatic and musical shows included Jack Benny, Stan Laurel, Edgar Bergan and Charlie McCarthy, the Eddie Foy Family, Phil Baker, Dr. Rockwell and Lyle Abbott. Among the shows were Blossom Time, No No Nanette and The Student Prince.

In 1927 the Minnesota Amusement Company purchased the Orpheum and converted it to a movie theatre for B movies. The theatre eventually fell into disuse until 1954 when the Community Playhouse purchased the property. Since then, the Playhouse has presented both community theatre and traveling shows such as the Minneapolis-based Guthrie Theatre road company.

Through its long theatrical history and architectural elegance, the Orpheum represents a cultural landmark for the city of Sioux Falls.
