Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

St. Peter's Church is a fieldstone structure, located in rural town of Farmington in Washington County, just north of the city of West Bend. The rectangular plan church, measuring 55' x 30', is vernacular in style with the unusual feature of a half-octagonal apse. The gabled roof has a profiled cornice and a bell tower, now covered with sheet metal, capped with a hipped roof and cross. The entire roof, originally wood, was covered with asphalt shingles in 1974. There is a small chimney positioned on the roof peak, just forward of the apsidal break in the roofline. The sixteen above sixteen double-hung sash windows with fanlights are symmetrically placed, three on each side. The fanlight is repeated five feet above the front entrance. A bulls-eye window is above the apse door in the rear. All the windows have stone relieving arches and the doors feature segmental stone arches and wood lintels. The walls are twenty-four inches thick, contructed of random and split fieldstone with roughhewn quoins on the front corners. The cornerstone is dated 1861. While the fieldstone is without a pattern, a cross of darker stones is set in the wall above the front fanlight window.

The interior features a choir loft, constructed of wood with a short balustrade, and is reached by stairs near the front entrance. No other features are built in. The walls are undecorated white plaster. The apse was constructed to appear semi-circular in the interior. The floor is of original wide oak plank. A furnace has been placed in the center of the church but could be removed.

The church is situated on a slight rise of ground, close to the road, and surrounded by agricultural land. A cemetery, located behind and to the right of the structure, is not included in the nominated property. A small, one-story fieldstone structure located on an adjacent lot was once used as a schoolhouse by the St. Peter's congregation but is now under seperate ownership and is used for storage.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

St. Peter's Church is an outstanding and essentially unaltered example of fieldstone construction in Washington County, and a rare example of such construction applied to an ecclesiastic structure. Although fieldstone was a common building material in Washington County in the 19th century (with many fine fieldstone buildings remaining), only four fieldstone churches were identified in a reconnaissance survey of the county conducted by the State Historical Society of Wisconsin in the summer of 1977. The other three churches (St. Mathias Catholic Church, Town of West Bend, built 1867; St. Augustine Catholic Church, Town of Trenton, built 1855; St. Hubert's Catholic Church, Town of Richfield, built 1863) are similar to St. Peter's in size, but St. Peter's is distinguished by its unusual half-octagonal apse, a feature not easily constructed in random fieldstone. In addition, the vernacular church is distinguished by a cross fashioned from darker stone embedded in the front wall.

St. Peter's congregation was organized in 1846, and in 1855 the first church, a onestory log structure, was built on land donated to the Milwaukee diocese that year by Peter Schwin and Peter Welker, members of the congregation who were natives of Prussia. The present fieldstone church was erected in 1861 on the same land, constructed by Schwin, Welker, and other church members under the supervision of Dr. Joseph Salzmann, a missionary priest from Milwaukee. From the construction until 1867, the church's German-speaking congregation was served by a resident pastor, Simon Bartozs. After that, however, the church was served by visiting priests from nearby catholic churches.³ Services were held in German until 1930.⁴ Regular services have since been cancelled, and the church is now used twice yearly, for special Christmas and Easter services.

Verbal boundary description and justification:
