Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Storm House is a two-story, stucco, Spanish Colonial Revival style stucture, built in 1930 by G. E. Martin. It is distinguished in its flat-land location by the red clay tile roof, tan stucco, arcaded porch, decorative wood brackets and balusters, garden walls, unusual oriel window and landscaping. Eight bedrooms, two baths, dining room, living room, kitchen utility room and library are the spaces found on the two floors of the residence. The library, located on the second floor, is contained in a unorthodox space resembling the stern of an old Spanish sailing vessel. This protrubance on the end of the structure is the oriel window even though its not in the usual configuration of Original hot water radiators continue to provide the heat for one. the house, however, five fireplaces plumbed for natural gas serve as the back-up if additional heat is required. A small basement contains the furnace which heats radiator water. Generous use of exposed wood cannot be overlooked, being in evidence in the beams of the ceilings, mahogany floors and the main entrance of Philippine mahogany with its special wrought iron hardware.

Maids quarters, of the same architectural style as the house, now serve as a guest house. With the exception of very minor remodeling, the addition of the utility area and patio, the structure remains in almost original condition.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Storm House is significant for its architectural style.

The Storm family, prominent in the development of Elk City, a far western Oklahoma community, had their home designed in the Spanish Colonial Revival style. Architect P.A. Engwall began work on the design in approximately 1927, and G. E. Martin completed construction in 1930. The structure possesses many features characteristice of the Spanish Colonial Revival style which experienced great popularity during the period 1915-1945. An unusual oriel window gives individuality to the house. Remaining in excellent condition, the Storm House is the best example of the style found in this town of 9,600 population.
