The Carraway House is a significant architectural structure within the context of Magnolia's historic resources. The one-story, picturesquely massed residence exhibits many of the Queen Anne influences found in Magnolia's Southtown district. These influences, such as the intricate bargeboards and conical-roofed porch retreat, and even the elaborate entrance consisting of a single-leaf door with transom and sidelights, substantiate the historic link between the developments of each area of town. The Carraway House is structurally similar to the Owens House, 150 West Myrtle, located a few blocks away. No genealogical link has been verified between the original owners of the two residences, nor between the architect/contractor who might have built both residences.
