Description of physical appearance & significant architectural features: (Include additions, alterations, ancillary structures, and landscaping if applicable)

The Peter Axel Johnson house is a 1-1/2 story stone dwelling. The original house (the shaded portion of the attached floorplan) was constructed c. 1876 and has the three-room plan which falls into TYPE II of the pair house classification system. The house was constructed of the local "soft rock", a soft, porous tufa that was used in the construction of many houses and buildings in Pleasant Grove during the late nineteenth century. There are paired stove chimneys on the ridge and the five-bay facade is characteristically asymmetrical. A rear 1-1/2 story ell extension was added to the origina house, probably by Johnson during the late 19th century. This section has a hipped roo which extends several feet higher than the original roof line and is visible from the front of the house. While this work has obscured the original stone exterior, the importance of the rare pair house form make this house a significant contribution to Utah's architectural landscape. There are several outbuildings located on the property, none of which contribute to the significance of the house, therefore, they are not included in the nomination.

## Statement of Historical Significance:

Construction Date: *c*.1876

The Peter Axel Johnson house, constructed c. 1876, is one of 56 examples of the Scandinavian "pair house" type that have been recored in Utah. Graphically documenting the migration of thousands of Scandinavian converts to Mormon Utah during the seconhalf of the 19th century, the pair house form makes a significant contribution to the architectural history of the state. The Johnson house is to be included in the thematic nomination, "Scandinavian-American Pair Houses", listed on the National Register in 1983\*.

Peter Axel Johnson was born in Alminge, Sweden, on February 20, 1843. A convert to the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, Johnson emigrated to Utah in 1871. He worked several years in Salt Lake City before moving to the town of Pleasant Grove in 1873, building this stone house shortly after he purchased the building lot in 1876. He and his wife Caroline, also a native of Sweden, raised eight children while living in this house. Johnson farmed and helped construct the railroads that ran to the mines in American Fork Canyon and various canyons in the Salt Lake Valley. He died in 1936 Earlier, in 1925, he sold the house to John T. Williams. The house today remains in the Williams family.

<sup>\*</sup>The original nomination contained 16 buildings out of a total of 48 that had been documented at the time. Since 1983, 8 new examples of the house form have been identified. Four pair houses have been listed on the National Register separately or a part of historic districts.
