

DESCRIPTION

ARCHITECTURAL STYLE Victorian Italianate DATE c.1876

FORM 2 stories, irregular plan; multiple decked hipped roofs; three-bay front w/entry to right of center; polygonal window bay south side MATERIALS frame on stone basement

FENESTRATION 1/1 d.h.s.; molded, projecting cornices bracketted modillion cornice, flat brackets on porch with slender, turned posts

ALTERATIONS none of significance

SITE

ARCHITECTURAL SIGNIFICANCE The James E. Lindsay house is one of several Victorian Italianate residences located in the Fulton Addition along Bridge and College Avenues. It is a representative example of its type in Davenport, retaining a handsome cornice, window trim, original porch and double doors of the main entry. The somewhat irregular roofscape and progressive setback of projecting masses, along with its more vertical quality, suggest how the style evolved in the city from the simpler, cubic versions built before the Civil War.

HISTORICAL DATA

James E. Lindsay built this house as a family residence around 1876. Lindsay was a partner of John B. Phelps in the major East Davenport lumber company that operated as "Lindsay & Phelps Lumber Co." Lindsay entered the local lumber business in 1861, built a mill in 1866, and expanded in the 1880's. In 1882, he began diversifying his lumber holdings with purchases of timberland in Arkansas, and later in northern Minnesota and the Northwestern U.S. Lindsay was well-known and successful in each of his lumber and land ventures. The house was acquired from his estate in the early 20th century by W.T. Waterman, who remodelled portions of the interior in 1921. Waterman was an associate in the local law firm of Lane and Waterman, of which his father, C.M. Waterman, was a founding partner. This firm continues to operate under this same name.


