### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

Trinity Episcopal Church is located in the small community of St. Charles, Minnesota. The simple one storey structure, measuring approximately 30 X 55, sits atop a limestone basement. The Carpenter Gothic design of the church is reflected in the board and batten exterior wall surfaces, lancet windows with art glass lights and modest bell tower with open belfrey. A gable roof with moulded cornice caps the structure.

The interior of the 1874 church remains remarkably intact. The simple nave with plaster walls above beaded wainscot, wooden truss ceiling and oak pews are all dramatically enlivened by the luminous art glass. In the chancel area, paired Gothic Revival side chairs, c. 1860, accentuate the timelessness of the setting. Only the modern carpeting covering the original maple flooring jars one back to the present time.

The church, which appears unaltered from its original design, is in good condition and stands on its original site.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Trinity Episcopal Church is significant for the survival integrity of its Carpenter Gothic architectural style. The original congregation formed as early as 1864, but did not formally organize until four years later. Services were conducted in several buildings until, in 1874, the parish erected its church. The modest church building exhibits characteristics of its style in its board and batten exterior, lancet windows, and bell tower with open belfrey. The unaltered interior features beaded wainscot, wooden truss ceiling, oak pews, and light fixtures dating from the installation of electricity in the 1920s. The integrity of the church's 1870s exterior and interior architectural style make it a distinctive element in the southeast region of Minnesota.
