Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The three story, masonry Margaret Block is located in the center of a solid block of early 20th Century commercial buildings on Central Avenue in Great Falls. The influence of the Prairie School is evident in the architect's choice of decorative features on the facade of the building that strongly emphasize horizontal lines: stone belt course, wide window openings with flat arches above and stone sills with decorative brick corbelling beneath, soldier brick courses, corbelled parapet with stone coping, and pendant-like decorative brick work with horizontal bands. The overall effect of the facade is one of balance, careful proportioning, and quiet repose.

Typical of many buildings of the 1910's period in Great Falls, the first floor of the Margaret Block was used for retail commercial space while the upper two floors served as a residential hotel. The central, sidewalk entry with oak double doors leads to the stairway to the upstairs hotel. Both the second and third floors feature double-loaded corridors with simple fir detailing, consisting of chair moldings and doors with transon lights. Each hotel room featured a Murphy bed and lavatory. Men's and women's bathing facilities were located on each floor. On the roof of the building, a small gable roofed structure provided storage room for the residents' trunks. The hotel closed in 1979; all of the original detailing is still in place.

Numerous alterations have occurred since the original construction of the Margaret Block. The two first floor store fronts were remodeled during the 1950's. The original store fronts were open spans with four cast iron pillars and steel spandrels. The upper portion of the storefronts were infilled with amethyst glass; the lower portions were divided into large display windows. Double doors, located at the center of the facade provided access to the upper level hotel rooms. The present flat, sheet metal awning that spans the front facade, although stripped of some detailing, may be original to the building.

The upper level windows were originally an unusual sash configuration of 3/2 and 4/2. These windows were replaced during the 1950's with metal 1/3 sash. The present owners plan to replace these metal windows with wooden sash units that conform to the original design.

Although the Margaret Block has experienced a number of alterations over the years, the building has retained primary historic architectural integrity of design, materials, association, and feeling.

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the ranching operation to Chouteau County, east of the Highwood Mountains. There he took up homestead, desert land, stone, and timber claims which provided the land base for the establishment of the Big Sag Land and Livestock Company. This enterprise has been an important factor in the stock industry of Montana since its inception as well as a great financial success. Kingsbury served as the general manager and president until his death in 1924. Kingsbury was also the general manager of the Chouteau Live Stock Company that was formed in 1882 and numerous other stock raising ventures during the fifty three years of his involvement in the industry.

Kingsbury made his residence in Great Falls during the early 1890's where he financially assisted the construction of numerous civic buildings, such as the Grand Opera House, the purchase of land for the Great Falls Post Office and Federal Building, and St. Ann's Cathedral. He also served for many years as one of the directors of the First National Bank of Great Falls. In 1894, Kingsbury married Margaret Rosan Britt. The Margaret Block, one of his later investments in the city, was named for his wife. The Kingsbury residence, an imposing Queen Anne structure at 627 4th Avenue North, was judged to be potentially eligible for listing in the National Register of Historic Places as a result of the recently completed Great Falls Historic Resource Survey.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Margaret Block, built in 1914 on Central Avenue, is significant as an intact example of Prairie Commercial architecture in Great Falls, Montana. Additional significance is lent to the building due to its association with Adkin Wallace Kingsbury, a man who played a prominent role in the development of the stock raising industry in Central Montana.

Designed by the local architect Hiram N. Black, the three story, masonry Margaret Block exhibits design elements common to the Prairie Commercial style. extensive brick corbelling used on the built-out brick cornice with corbelled brick pendants and the wide window openings originally featuring 4/2 and 3/2 double hung sash work to create a strong horizontal emphasis to the front facade, typical of the Prairie Commercial style. Stone coping on the cornice and papapet, sills. and flat window arches with key stones add textural and visual interest Although the first floor storefronts and the sash pattern of to the facade. the upper story windows have been changed, the Margaret Block still possesses sufficient historic integrity of design and detailing to successfully evoke the historic period of the building's construction. During the 1910's, Great Falls emerged as the major trade center for an enormous agricultural area on the Central Montana plains, which was becoming rapidly settled and intensively cultivated by thousands of homesteaders. Extensive commercial construction was undertaken in Great Falls during this decade. As was typical of many of the commercial buildings constructed during this period of great population growth, the Margaret Block combined commercial space on the lower level with a residential hotel located above. The Margaret Block is one of the few commercial buildings located in the central business district of the city to retain primary historic architectural integrity. The present owners plan to replace the existing windows with wood frame sash that more closely resembles the original fenestration pattern.

A.W. Kingsbury came to the Montana in 1864 from Missouri, not to make a fortune in the gold fields but to develop one of the largest stock raising operations in the State. In partnership with Major William Davenport and Thomas A. Ray of Helena, Kingsbury is credited with bringing the first band of stock sheep into the State over the Continental Divide from Oregon in 1871. From this parent organization of Davenport, Ray & Co. (the 29 year old Kingsbury as the "Company"), reputedly sprang all successive sheep companies in Montana. Kingsbury was in charge of all the actual herding, feeding, and caretaking of the animals and, by 1873 had added cattle raising to the business. In 1880, Kingsbury moved


