Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The parish church San José of Gurabo sits on a corner lot with its side (instead of its main facade as is traditional of historic churches in Puerto Rico) facing the town plaza. It is oriented on an east-west axis, its entrance facing west. It is separated from its immediate surroundings by a low wall enclosing a parking area.

The plan consists of a single nave covered with a large concrete barrel vault. Originally this church was covered with a wooden roof. However, it has thick buttresses on the exterior indicating that it might have been designed for a vault. At the entrance there is a vestibule with stairs on its left side that lead to a wooden choir loft on the second level. The vaulted roof over the choir loft is at a higher level than that of the rest of the church. Three small arched windows on each side of the vault illuminate the interior space. There are four bays. Two blind arches serve as chapels on each side of the main nave. The apse is covered with a lanterned dome perforated by four windows. The neoclassic altar has three sections and three niches, and is crowned by a triangular pediment. The floors are covered with colored native cement tiles. The doors are made of wood and are rectangular, even though the wall opening has an arched shape. The walls are built of brick and mortar.

The facade has been altered at least three times during the years (see enclosed diagram, prepared and researched by Arch. Thomas S. Marvel). It is divided into three levels plus the bell tower. On the lower level a central arched doorway is framed by two pilasters holding a straight entablature. There are two large buttresses on the corners of the facade. The second level includes a wooden louvered window that gives light to the choir loft. A cornice divides this level from the third one. The vault profile crowns the facade. A small bell tower provides a vertical anchor to the entrance doorway.

Each of the side facades has a simple neoclassical doorway recessed into an arch flanked by buttresses. A large parish house is attached to the left side and to the rear of the church. On the right side some garages have also been added. In 1930 the wooden roof was replaced by the existing concrete vault, and a concrete dome was built over the apse. The structure is in good condition, specially the interior spaces.


Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The church San José of Gurabo is of architectural and historical importance. The original structure was finished in 1821 and, in 1886, it underwent major repairs adding height to the existing walls and incorporating the choir loft. Even though the facade has been altered several times through the years, the church retains its original brick masonry walls, apse and original 1886 wooden choir loft. It is one of the few churches on the Island that uses a one nave plan instead of the more frequently used basilical arrangement. The historic relationship between the church, town plaza and city hall is maintained in Gurabo, being these urban elements the center of town life. This arrangement is an example of the town planning practices characteristic of the Spanish colonial period in Puerto Rico.


