#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Completed in 1858, Walnut Grove is a two-and-and-a-half-story, brick house located on the east side of North Main Street in the town of Mt. Pleasant (pop. 3,350) in central Middle Tennessee. The Greek Revival building is distinguished by a two-story pedimented portico with square Tuscan pillars. The interior of the house contains almost all of its original Greek Revival moldings, mantels, and doors. The building has been little altered and retains it architectural integrity. On the property is a two-story brick kitchen built around 1826 and associated with an earlier house on the site.

Facing west, Walnut Grove is situated on a relatively flat site on Mt. Pleasant's principal road in a residential section of the town. The informally landscaped grounds cover almost four acres and have many mature trees. A concrete path extends from the front of the house to the street.

The three-bay west (front) facade is laid in common bond and has the building's most formal detailing. The middle of the three bays has a two-story pedimented portico of yellow poplar with a second-story balcony and square Tuscan pillars measuring 27 feet tall and 18 inches square at the base. The first-story doorway has transoms and sidelights of original cranberry glass. The windows on the first and second stories are six-over-six double-hung sash with molded lintels and louvered shutters. A simple dentilated cornice terminates the second story. The house has its original standing seam metal roof.

The north and south facades are the same with double end-chimneys connected by a pent at the gable peak. On the first and second stories between the chimneys are two windows with plain lintels and six-over-six double-hung sash. A similar single window is on the third story.

The east (rear) facade has an irregular fenestration of two doorways and two windows on the first story and three windows on the second. The windows are the same as on the north and south facades.

On the first and second floors, Walnut Grove's interior consists of a central hall plan with four rooms 17 feet square and a hallway 14 feet wide. The third floor is a single, large rectangular room. A half-turn staircase with a simple newel post and square balusters is located at the rear of the first-floor hall. Among the Greek Revival details on the interior are shouldered door surrounds, paneled doors, and trabeated mantels. Woods used on the interior are walnut, cherry, pine, and ash.

Immediately behind the house is a two-story, brick building, which was constructed prior to 1826 and served as a kitchen for a house which was torn down in 1857 after being severely damaged by a fire. The present main house was built on the same site as the previous one. The kitchen has traditionally been considered the oldest brick building in the Mt. Pleasant area.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Walnut Grove (the Sabra Lawrence House) is nominated under National Register criteria B and C for its architectural and historical significance to Maury County. The house was built for Sabrina (Sabra) Boddie Lawrence (1787-1867), an important local landowner during the mid-nineteenth century. Designed by the prominent master builder, Nathan Vaught, Walnut Grove is an excellent regional example of the Greek Revival style.

The land on which Walnut Grove stands was owned by the Reverend Hugh Shaw, a Presbyterian minister who according to tradition built the early house of which only the detached kitchen remains. The property was purchased around 1826 by William Henry Boddie, who came to Maury County from Northhampton County, North Carolina. Boddie acquired large land holdings of over 1600 acres in Maury County and bred and raced thoroughbred horses. He became a highly respected person in the area and numbered among his friends Lucius J. Polk, John Dawson, and Nicholas Long.

When Boddie died in 1841, he left his entire estate to his widowed sister, Sabra Lawrence, who had come to Maury County in 1826 with her brother and her family. Unusually independent for a Victorian woman, Sabra Lawrence personally managed the extensive plantation for the next 25 years and by the time of the Civil War owned more slaves and almost as much land as any person in wealthy Maury County. Through her five daughters, her descendants continued to be prominent in the surrounding area.

In 1857 the original house on the Walnut Grove site burned, leaving only the separate kitchen. According to Nathan Vaught's son, Charles, his architect father designed and built the current house for Sabra Lawrence in 1858. After Sabra Lawrence died in 1867, the new house was inherited by one of her married daughters, Sabra B. Francis. Around 1880 Walnut Grove was sold, or possibly just leased, by the daughter for an Episcopal school for boys and became known as the Otey School. An old schoolhouse was remodeled, and the house was used as a dormitory for the teachers and students. The school lasted only a few years in Mt. Pleasant, and in 1888 Walnut Grove was sold to Mumford Smith. However, the house was to have a further connection with local education as the home of Miss Annie Smith, a local school teacher from the 1920s to the 1940s who is fondly remembered by many generations of Mt. Pleasant citizens. In 1982 the house was sold by the Smith family to Mr. and Mrs. James H. Jones, Jr., who carefully restored the house for their home.

Walnut Grove is an outstanding local example of the Greek Revival style of the late 1850s. The quality of its design and craftsmanship can be seen in its fenestration, well-proportioned portico, and interior moldings, doors, and mantels. The house is also significant as a late example of the work of the local master builder, Nathan Vaught (1799-1880), who designed Clifton Place, Pillow Place, and Bethel Place in Maury County.
