4/27/84 DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The architectural style of the Petaluma Main Post Office is essentially Spanish Colonial Revival though the bizarre gargoyle-like downspout appear to derive from Spanish Gothic archetypes. The front elevation consists of five arches forming a central portion, flanked by two recessed wings. A terracottafrieze runs the length of the building.

### LOCAL CONTEXT

Petaluma is an agricultural town approximatley 40 miles north of San Francisco near California's coast. From its founding in the early 1800s, the town's economy has been based on the surrounding agricultrual areas, acting as a shipping and processing point for transporting poultry and produce to San Francisco.

### PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The building appears to bei inexcellent structural condition. The grounds have been well maintained and there are no structural or flooding problems.

The foundation and bearing walls are steel reinforced concrete, and the floors are concrete beams and poured slab. The exterior walls are covered with a buff-colored stucco/ The lobby is covered with a pitched roof covered with red clay tiles, and the workroom has a flat asphalt-composition roof.

The building is decorated with ornament in an electic mix of styles, with a predominately Italianante-Mediterranean flavor, all applied to the standard classical box characteristic of the Supervising Architect's office.

The rigidly symmetrical main facade is articulated with five arches cut into the wall surface the central arch houses the front entrance, which is elaborated with two dark green veines marble columns carrying a marble entablature. All five arches are decorated with wrough iron scrollwork, suggesting Spanish Baroque archetypes. The bottom of each window opening is filled with the same veined marble used on the front entrance. The cast keystones at the top of the main-facade arches are decorated with inverted chevrons suggestive of Art Deco design, and six terracotta gargoules are placed on the piers that carr the arcade. A classically-inspired egg-and-dart molding decorates the eave line. Two standard cast bronze lighting fixtures flank the main entrance. A large geometricized eagle is proved over the front entrance, and breaks above the eave line on the line of symmetry of the facade.

Two wings flank the arcaded central portion of the front elevation, each containing a mullioned twelve-light window. An oval medallion is centered directly above each of these side windows. Three terracotta plaques are placed on a level with the gargoyles. The central plaque medallion contains a fleur-de-lis, identical to those described for the front elevation.

The public lobby has white plaster walls, and a dark marble is used for both the floor and wainscoting. A decorative wrought iron screen over the lockboxes and service counter separates the lobby from the workroom. The workroom has white painted plaster walls and a parquet hardwood floor.

### ALTERATIONS

The mailing platform on the south end (rear) of the building is currently being expanded to increase capacity. Several minor changes in the building floor plans have been made since it was completed in 1933.

A skylight over the workroom was covered when air conditioning was installed in the basement in the 1960s. The original lights in the workroom have been replaced with fluorescent lighting. The mailing platform is south of the workroom; an addition is currently under construction.

Also to the rear of the workroom is a mezzanine containing the swing room and a toilet. A lookout, originally constructed for the postmaster's use, has been enclosed. The service counter is located in the center of the lobby opposite the vestibule; the original service windows have been replaced with a single open counter. In the late 1960s, the east wall of the lobby was extended into the northeast corner of the work area (in what was the mail order and registry room) and an additional set of lockboxes was installed.

The original brass-framed glass doors have been replaced with black anodized aluminum and glass doors. The front steps are masonry; the original wrought iron railings and window balconies were in poor condition and were recently replaced for safety reasons. The handicap access ramp, now under construction on the west side of the entrance, will be concrete.

The floor of the lobby expansion area was matched to the rest of the lobby floor using marble slabs taken from the original swing room shower stalls. The original service windows have been replaced by an open service counter with a black plastic counter top. Wood panelling behind the counter was installed last year to close the view of the workroom from the lobby.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Petaluma Post Office derives its significance from its relation to the federal building programs of the 1920s and 1930s as they developed in California. It is an example of a style transitional between the classicism of the twenties and the Starved Classical style of the thirties.

### ARCHITECTURE

Though completed in 1933, the Petaluma Main Post Office was authorized and funded by the 1926 Keyes-Elliot Act, and is an excellent example of the type of building constructed under this Act. The use of a central arcade flanked by projecting or recessed wings came to be a hallmark of designs of the late twenties and early thirties, and was one of the primary signifiers used in post office designs. The concept monumentalized the entrance, and did so without incurring any significiant additional cost. The building is thus significant under National Register Criterion C on the state level as an excellent example of a type, period and method of constuction. The Petaluma Main Post Office retains substantial integrity of location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association.




