Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Universalist Church is prominantly situated on a hill in the center of the Village of Dexter. To the north, east and west are a mixture of residential, commercial and public buildings, while below the church to the south is the central business district. This rectangular structure is constructed of wood with a gable roof. The main body of the church has clapboard siding and tall square windows with stained glass. On the front (west) facade is a tower and vestibule with flush-board siding. There is a two-story ell on the rear (east) which dates from 1912.

The outstanding architectural features of the church are concentrated on the front. A tower in the center of this elevation includes a belfry and steeple. It is flanked by a two-story vestibule with a hip roof and tall segmental arched windows. At the base of the tower is a small entrance vestibule with segmental arched panel doors and a pedimented cornice. The ornamental details on the tower include recessed panels in a variety of configurations and floral trim which is either incised or applied. The cornice with guttae and modillion blocks and the raised basement with rusticated horizontal siding unifies the 1870 tower with the original structure.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Ranking among the best work of the profilic Thomas W. Silloway of Boston, a noted architect and also a Universalist minister, this is really a building of 1867-70 although the frame of the original church structure of 1828-29 remains intact. The architect after considerable deliberation with the elders of the church concluded that, although a new church building was wanted, the proportions of the old church were such that its basic structure could be reused.

Silloway designed a great many churches throughout **N**ew England, as well as the present Vermont Statehouse. He also wrote several books on both architecture and theology. His other work in Maine includes the Universalist Church in Lewiston (destroyed), the Trinitarian Church in Castine (extant), the Unitarian-Universalist Church in Calais (destroyed), the Universalist Church in Augusta (remodelled for shops), the Baptist Church in Springvale (extant), and the Second Congregational Church in Biddeford (altered).

Of passing interest is the fact that the ceiling and all walls (except the front) of the sanctuary are completely covered by pressed metal.
